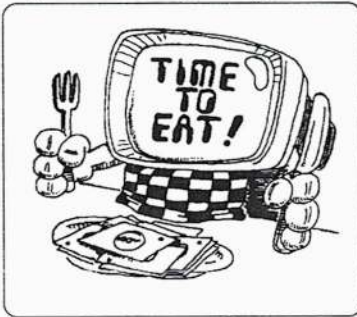
Meeting August 1st at IU20

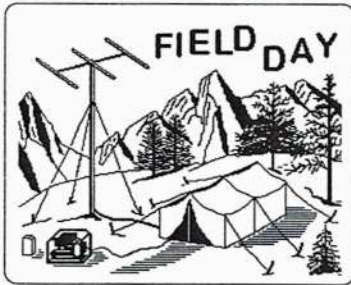

Field Day 2002

On Saturday June 22, and Sunday June 23, members of DLARC and guests participated in Field Day 2002 at the Farmer's Grove in Plainfield Township. With the help of everyone that attended,



it was a successful and fun event!

Saturday started out with several hams meeting at Gracedale to pick up equipment from the Milk House and barn, while other hams went straight to the

Farmer's Grove to start setting up. The people setting up had to get past some initial problems – the water was not turned on yet, and the pavilions were pretty messy, with dirt and leaves in abundance.

The decision was made to run as a 4A entry, with stations initially for 80 meters, 40 meters, 20 meters, and 10 meters. In addition to those 4 stations, there was a VHF/UHF station (running 6 meters), and a Get On The Air (GOTA) station, for a total of 6 stations making contacts! This meant that we had to have 6 computers running CT for logging. With the help of Van, K3CP, we were able to get all 6 computers up and running the logging program. In addition, there was an APRS demonstration station set up and explained throughout the event.

A variety of antennas were used during the weekend – dipoles, a yagi, and a multi-band vertical. There was even a real fancy rotor used on the 6-meter yagi (i.e. vise-grips on the pole). There were some problems with the 20-meter station this year, with the antenna being replaced a couple of times, and finally a new antenna was built and put up.

What is Field Day with out good food and refreshments? Jill, N3ZSR (and her helpers) organized the food and refreshments for Field Day this year. As I'm sure everyone that was there will agree – it was done very well! There was plenty of food and drinks throughout the day (and night, and following day). Thanks Jill for keeping us well fed!

This year there were at least 38 people who came to help out in some way (setting up, operating, tearing down, providing moral support, etc.). There were also 2 out of state hams that came in and

helped operate. They were Chad, N0VUP, from Kansas, and Andrew, WV1B from California. The head of the American Red Cross of the Greater Lehigh Valley, John Hughes, also came out to visit us to see how we were able to set up, run on emergency power, and communicate with other hams around the world.

Field Day started to come to an end at 1800 UTC on June 23 (2:00 PM local time), which is when the stations stopped transmitting, and people started to tear down the equipment. Many hands helped during this process, which made the job go much faster and easier. Ken, N3IYX, who brought much of the club equipment, wires, antennas, etc., helped supervise the organizing and packing up of that equipment. Others helped with loading and hauling the equipment that went back to the Milk House and barn at Gracedale.

Total points = 2460 + 900 Bonus points = 3360 points.

The Bonus points were: 100% Emergency Power (400), Media Publicity (100), Set-up in Public Place (100), Information Booth (100), Site Visited by invited official (100), and Non-Traditional Demonstration modes – APRS (100).

As you can see from the above table, the 6-meter station had the second highest number of contacts. Thanks to Barry, N3NVA, for setting up and running this station. George, N3SQD, brought, set-up, and ran the 40-meter station, and Ken, N3IYX, brought in the 20-meter station, and Andrew, WV1B, was kind enough to bring in enough parts (power supply, microphone, and

computer) to get the 10-meter running. The other stations were set up using the club's equipment.

This was the first year that Benjamin, KB3GOU (Field Day Chairman), and I participated in a Field Day, let alone trying to organize one. This could not have been accomplished without many of you helping us out. We would like to especially thank Ken, N3IYX, for helping us throughout the process, and gently making suggestions on what needed to be done.

Both Benjamin and I have learned a lot this year, and we appreciate the support we received from the all those that participated in Field Day. Thank you!

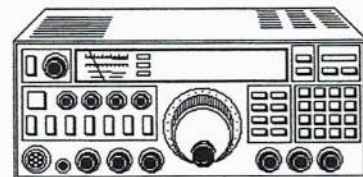

ARRL comments on FCC spectrum policy

The ARRL has told the FCC that marketplace forces should not determine Amateur Radio spectrum allocations and that interference management is a technical, not an economic, issue. Those opinions and others came this week in response to a call in early June from the FCC Spectrum Policy Task Force for comments on various issues related to FCC spectrum policy.



"The value to the public of a vital, growing Amateur Radio Service, while perhaps only indirectly measurable in market terms, cannot translate to a marketplace ability to pay for spectrum, no matter what the mechanism," the League asserted. "The non-pecuniary character of Amateur Radio makes it uniquely unsuitable for market-oriented allocation processes." Such a policy, the ARRL said, would "preclude Amateur Radio communications."

The ARRL compared Amateur Radio spectrum to a public park or right-of-way. "Given the wide availability of Amateur Radio to the general public and its value as an educational and public

service resource, the concept fits well," the League said.

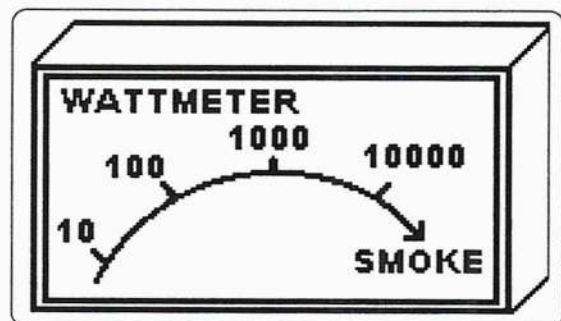
The ARRL said that "economic balancing" among parties is not the proper mechanism to resolve interference issues. The League said that many interference issues are dealt with using technical solutions that accommodate both parties. An economic model presumes a preference for one service over another, the ARRL asserted.

The ARRL again took advantage of the comment opportunity to reiterate its views on the deployment of unlicensed devices under Part 15 rules. Petitioners seeking authorization for new devices or technology that impacts licensed users should bear the burden of demonstrating the current state of use of the band by its own technical calculations or measurements in certain types of environments, the ARRL said. Noting its own participation in a noise study that will contribute to a better understanding about ambient noise, the ARRL said the FCC should require proponents of new devices or technology to provide "studies of individual and aggregate interference potential and effect on ambient noise."

The League also restated its view that unlicensed devices cannot be authorized unless the FCC determines that the devices "do not have a significant interference potential to licensed services."

Petitioners also should provide technical sharing studies every time they propose a new allocation or file a petition for a new unlicensed service, the ARRL said. The League's comments reiterated the goal of the Amateur Radio Spectrum Protection Act, now in Congress as HR 817 and S 549. The measure would provide equivalent replacement spectrum for the Amateur Service just as it typically does for users displaced as a result of spectrum auctions.

FCC dismisses EMP shielding petition

The FCC has dismissed a petition that would have required all electronic equipment subject to the Commission's jurisdiction--possibly including amateur gear--to be shielded against electromagnetic pulse (EMP) damage. The petition, filed last fall by Don Schellhardt and Nick Leggett, N3NL, was put on public notice in December and designated as RM-10330.

"The comments filed in response to the Public Notice overwhelmingly favor dismissing the petition for rule making," the FCC told the petitioners by letter May 24. "Contrary to your claim, several commenters point to standards that the industry has adopted which address EMP protection." Fourteen parties filed comments, and four separate parties filed replies, the FCC said in turning down the petition. The ARRL did not comment on the Schellhardt-Leggett proposal.

As drafted, the Schellhardt-Leggett proposals would have applied to both new and existing equipment falling within its scope and would have included at least some Amateur Radio equipment. In 1986, Schellhardt and Leggett filed a similar petition with the FCC seeking a Notice of Inquiry on possible shielding of electronics against EMP. They say the September 11 terrorist attacks motivated them to approach the FCC once more on the topic. EMP--a high-voltage wave of electromagnetic energy--already is known to be a side effect of a thermonuclear explosion. But Schellhardt and Leggett claimed that terrorists could initiate an EMP using other technology--so-called "E bombs"--developed by the US military but, as yet, untested on a major scale.

Leggett told the ARRL that the primary intention was to promote serious discussion on the EMP issue.

The FCC noted that among the commenters was the Alliance for Telecommunications Industry Solutions (ATIS), which argued that its Committee T1 was developing standards to protect telephone switching facilities from EMP. The International Electrotechnical Commission (IEC) also indicated that it was developing voluntary EMP standards aimed at the protection of commercial buildings and equipment. A voluntary EMP standards development process, the FCC concluded, "is the best method for developing guidelines and safeguards to address protection of the communications infrastructure." In light of that activity, the FCC added, "it appears that government intervention is not warranted."
