The DLARCforum

A few years ago the Executive Committee established an electronic mailing list for D.L.A.R.C.



members and friends to provide an easy way to disseminate information on a timely basis. That mailing list is called the "DLARCforum" and all club members with email capability are welcome to

join. Currently there are approximately 120 members and friends who are subscribers.

Joining the list is easy. If you have internet access, just go to this web site:

http://mailman.qth.net/mailman/listinfo/dlarcforum and fill in the appropriate boxes. Instructions for the subscription process are available on the page. If you don't have internet access but you do have email service you can still subscribe by sending a subscription request directly to the list administrator, ka3jwe@arrl.net.

The DLARCforum is a "closed" list which means that only subscribers can post messages, so your mailbox won't be filled with junk mail from

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unknown sources. The list uses a "text only" format which means that only messages in plain text are passed. Messages received in HTML are filtered and stripped of any formatting before being sent out to list subscribers. The list will not accept or pass any attachments such as files or pictures. This is done to eliminate the possibility of spreading any type of computer virus or other harmful program. The forum is an "un-moderated" list which means that there is no moderator screening messages before they are allowed to be posted.

Since its beginning, the volume of messages on the DLARCforum has been relatively low compared to other similar mailing lists. So, don't worry, your inbox won't be overflowing with messages if you subscribe. There is also the ability to configure your preferences for the list to your personal liking.

So, please consider joining the list if you're not already subscribed. You'll be better informed about current club activities and also have the knowledge and experience of over half the membership at your disposal. Anything you want to know, all you have to do is ask!

DLARCforum Usage Guidelines

The DLARCforum is meant to be used to pass relevant information about the club, its activities,



events and other amateur radio related topics. You can use it to ask questions of a general or specific nature relating to the club or anything which concerns amateur radio. Round-table discussions are encouraged but please try to stay focused on the

specific topic being discussed. You may advertise items for sale as long as they are amateur radio related.

Topics of general interest may be discussed but please be sure that the topic is appropriate for the club forum and general membership. Please refrain from using the forum to discuss volatile topics unrelated to amateur radio. Occasional humorous anecdotes may be posted if relevant to the membership. However, the forum is not to be used as a "joke bulletin board".

If you are uncertain about posting any information that could possibly be inappropriate or controversial but has relevance to amateur radio or the membership then please contact the list administrator or an Executive Committee member for advice and/or approval.

Please refrain from forwarding messages to the forum without verifying the accuracy and validity of the information. Many messages received from unsubstantiated sources concerning computer viruses, missing children, alleged scams, etc., that prompt you to "send this to everyone you know", often turn out to be highly inaccurate or complete and total hoaxes. Forwarding this type of information without verifying its authenticity and accuracy is irresponsible. (You should follow this guideline when forwarding any emails whether to the forum or membership in general.)

The general rules of amateur radio concerning noncommercial usage also apply to the forum. It is not to be used for commercial purposes, solicitation for profit or personal gain (excluding sales of radio related equipment, etc.) by any individuals or groups.

To avoid delays when posting messages to the forum, please remember to configure your email program to send "plain text" messages. You can usually find this setting in the options or configuration section of your particular email software.

You can only post messages to the forum using the email address which is subscribed. If you subscribed from your home computer using your home email address and attempt to post a message from your work computer using your work email address or any other computer with a different email address, it will be rejected. However, you can subscribe multiple addresses if you wish to use multiple systems.

Messages posted to the DLARCforum must have the address in the "TO:" line. Postings with the address in the "CC:" or "BCC:" lines will be rejected.

As a general rule, if you post a message and you

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don't get your message back via the DLARCforum (after a short processing delay) then it probably was rejected. The system might send you an automated message if it can determine why your post was rejected or you might get a message from the list administrator stating the reason for the rejection. If you are having difficulty posting or receiving messages, please contact the list administrator.

The D.L.A.R.C. Executive committee reserves the right of administration over the contents and membership of the DLARCforum.

Field Day 2003

On Saturday June 28, and Sunday June 29, members of DLARC and guests participated in Field Day 2003



at the Farmer's Grove in Plainfield Township. With the help of everyone that attended, it was a successful and fun event!

Saturday started out with

several hams meeting at Gracedale to pick up equipment from the Milk House and barn, while other hams went straight to the Farmer's Grove to start setting up. The decision was made to run as a 4A entry, with stations initially for 80 meters, 40 meters, 20 meters, and 10 meters. We only had 3 computers running CT for logging, which left one station having to log by hand.

A variety of antennas were used during the weekend dipoles, a yagi, and a multi-band vertical. Unlike last year, when there were some problems with the 20 meter antenna, this year the 20 meter antenna worked great.

What is Field Day with out good food and refreshments? Jill, N3ZSR (and her helpers) organized the food and refreshments for Field Day this year. As I'm sure everyone that was there will agree - it was done very well! There was plenty of food and drinks throughout the day (and night, and following day). Thanks Jill for keeping us well fed! This year there were at least 33 people who came to help out in some way (setting up, operating, tearing down, providing moral support, etc.). There were also at least 1 out of state ham that came in and helped - including setting up and operating the 20 meter station. Thank you, Andrew (WV1B from California) for joining us again this year!

Field Day started to come to an end at 1800 UTC on June 29 (2:00 PM local time), which is when the stations stopped transmitting, and people started to teardown the equipment. Many hands helped during this process, which made the job go much faster and easier. Ken, N3IYX, who brought much of the club equipment, wires, antennas, etc., helped supervise the organizing and packing up of that equipment. Others helped with loading and hauling the equipment that went back to the Milk House and barn at Gracedale.

Total points = 1566 + 600 Bonus points = **2166 points**.

The Bonus points were: 100% Emergency Power (400), Media Publicity (100), and Set-up in Public Place (100).

As you can see from the above table, the 10 meter station had a very small number of contacts. This was mostly due to the band conditions. There are more contacts for that station, but I have to find the hand written log that got packed away with some other material. George, N3SQD, brought, set-up, and ran the 40 meter station, Ken, N3IYX, brought in

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the 80 meter station, and Andrew, WV1B, was kind enough to bring in and set up the 20 meter station. The 10 meter station was set up using the club's equipment.

This was the second year that Benjamin, KB3GOU (Field Day Chairman), and I participated in, and organized Field Day. This could not have been accomplished without many of you helping us out. Both Benjamin and I appreciate the support we received from the all those that participated in Field Day. Thank you!

Hams a bright spot during power blackout

When a power blackout struck at least a half dozen eastern states August 14, many Amateur Radio



operators were ready and able to provide whatever assistance they could. Hardest hit were metropolitan areas like New York City, Detroit and Cleveland. With cellular systems overloaded

or out altogether, the incident turned into a test of Amateur Radio's capabilities to operate without commercial power.

New York City-Long Island Section Emergency Coordinator Tom Carrubba, KA2D, called the response "a good drill," but says it was a cautionary tale too. "The lesson is that everybody gets a little complacent," he said. "Have emergency power backup and make sure it's working!" By and large, Carrubba said, ARES members did what they were trained to do. "It's going to show the worth of Amateur Radio," he said of the blackout response. "There were people on the air immediately."

Diane Ortiz, K2DO, the Public Information Coordinator for NYC-Long Island was one of them. When power went down in her Suffolk County community, she started up an informal VHF net. Over the next 20 hours or so, it passed some 500 pieces of traffic. In addition to handling messages for people stranded in the city, amateurs also relayed useful information, such as which stores or filling stations were open and operating. With many radio and TV stations dark, hams were able to help fill the information void, Ortiz said.



In the Big Apple itself, ARES teams provided communication support for Red Cross Emergency Response Vehicles (ERVs) set up at main transportation centers in Manhattan. ARES members also accompanied ERVs on fire calls.

RACES activated in most Greater New York City area counties after a state of emergency was declared. Some ARES teams--including a few across the Hudson River in New Jersey--activated or remained on standby to help if called upon. In New Jersey, a net linked the Red Cross lead chapter's N2ARC in Princeton with other New Jersey ARC chapters.

Michigan Section Manager Dale Williams, WA8EFK, relied on his emergency generator. Some Michigan ARES teams assisted emergency operations centers and the Red Cross, he said. In Ohio, Section Emergency Coordinator Larry Rain, WD8IHP, reports that all ARES organizations in northern Ohio were activated. Still going strong at week's end were ARES teams in Cleveland and Akron. ARES handled communication support for Ohio Emergency Management.

Nancy Hall, KC4IYD--who lives west of Cleveland-said she's glad she took the ARRL Emergency Communications Level I class. "I have to say that being a ham and knowing about emergency preparedness did make life easier for me and my family," she said.
