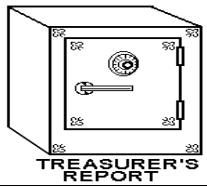

Major cheating going on by hams at QRZ. People are clicking on their own call over and again so as to increase the hit counter. This is not fair. It was also suggested that QRZ personnel might be taking kickbacks to increase one's counter number, so as to indicate one is more popular than another, this is not confirmed yet. Hit counter warfare is under way there. This is definitely not very nice. Click my call, and you will see I am falling behind other hams. <http://www.qrz.com/callsign/N2TTQ>. Upon further investigation by the Media Ecologist, it was found that many large contest stations have never been on

the air. What has been going on is, a number of hams operate from home by clicking continuously on QRZ so as to increase the hit counter by thousands of points. Several informants from the ham community that were on the inside have come forward to give this info. They also tell us that many retired hams, spend the entire day just clicking on QRZ so as to increase the hit counter so as to increase the ebay value of their qsl cards. As it stands, many hams are quitting their jobs so as to spend more time clicking qrz. It was also discovered some hams have developed an automated hit system. After each screen load, it triggers an internal program to refresh screen. As of date one ham has over one googleplex of hits and has only had his license for less than a week making older well-known contesters hams seem less popular. We at the Media Studies Center are asking the FCC to discontinue the daytime soap opera investigations and give high priority to this matter. By the way this practice is not just limited to ham radio, other web sites are involved with this hit counter fraud, in particular, John Kerry and George Bush sites. This makes code loss and BPL the least of our worries, if this trend of hit counter contesting continues.

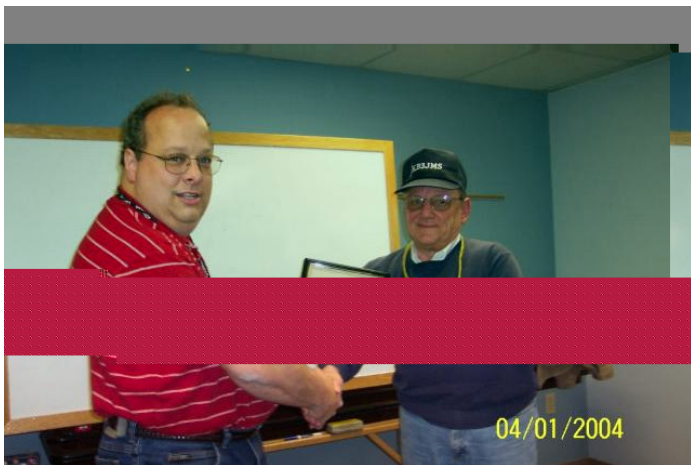

42 Volt Car Charging Systems

New automobile charging system will be 42 volts. Current systems are 14 volts. Although the electrical system is referred to as 12 volt, the alternator actually produces 14 volts (needed to maintain a full charge in sealed batteries). The new system will charge at 42 volts, with a 12 volt tap and a 42 volt tap. 12 volts for lights and current 12 volt accessories. Then a 36 volt battery to be used for starter, computer controlled actuators such as transmission shift solenoids, brake actuators, & engine controls (EGR & IAC). Also certain options such as power windows and convertible tops will become 36 volt. According to ' Motor Age' magazine, we should start seeing this next year (2005).

TECHNICAL & TECHNIQUE

Coax Tips

A lot of the RG-6 coax available from CATV is "flooded", meaning that it is filled with a viscous fluid designed to keep water out of the cable and can be buried. It also seems to discourage nibbling by rodents. If you do bury it, splicing may be a problem to keep dry. Bill VE3NH recommends bringing the joints up above ground inside a piece of large diameter plastic pipe covered with a pipe cap. Dwight W5USM suggests that a regular barrel connector can be used if covered with a self-sealing piece of heat-shrink - the type with a glue seal. John K9DX points out that a 70-ohm cable about the diameter of RG-11 may also be available and has much lower loss.

Steve K7LXC reminds us not to use coax with a solid center conductor for the rotator loop at the top of the tower where it must flex. The solid wire will eventually crack from metal fatigue. It might also

work its way through the insulation (this is a particular problem with air and foam dielectric cables) and short to the shield. Run the solid conductor cable to the top of the tower and then use a short service loop of stranded conductor cable.

As long as we' re on the subject of handling coax, Tree N6TR offers some pointers on handling surplus or CATV coax and hardline. "The first step is to figure out what kind of coax you have. I found most of mine on the Commscope Web site (<http://www.commscope.com>). K2UA says that pin-type connectors can be converted into male N-type connectors by screwing the output housing of an N-connector onto the threads of the pin connector, then trimming (and smoothing) the pin to the right length. Pin connectors can be found at <http://www.tmbrokersmontana.com> as well as splices for hardline. Coring tools that prepare the coax for connectors can often be found on eBay for \$20 to \$35. If you have 75-ohm hardline and want to convert it to 50 ohms, you can use a simple coax transformer as described in the 1981 July/Aug issue of the National Contest Journal.

The transformers consist of a 0.08165 wavelength length of 50-ohm and 75-ohm coax in series. The 75-ohm end connects to the transmitter and the 50-ohm end to the hardline run. The NCJ article shows the following lengths for coax with solid and foam insulation:

Band	Solid (.66VF)	Foam (.79VF)
80M	14' 8"	17' 7"
40M	7' 5"	8' 10"
20M	3' 9"	4' 6"
15M	30" - 36"	
10M	22" - 27"	

They are pretty broadband and I have also used them on six meters at 1500 watts without any problem. For 2 meters and above, cut the hardline to be some number of half wavelengths long so that the impedance will be the same at each end. You can test this with an SWR meter while leaving the cable' s far end open. Trim the length to get a high impedance (≥ 1000 Ohms). With this length, the impedance of the line doesn' t matte- whatever impedance, such as 50 ohms, connected at one end will be repeated at the other."

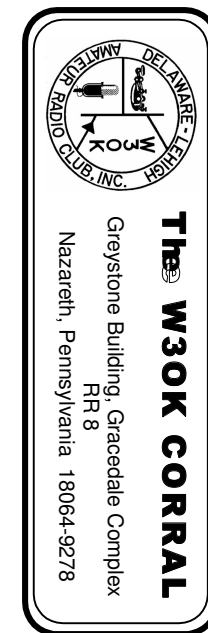
