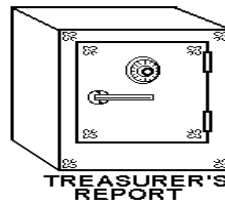
Mark July 17th on your calendars – that is the day for the Lehigh River Run and the Derriere in the

She did mention that she toured some of the area devastated by the Asian Pacific tsunami. This is one of the reasons we need to support the agency because they are helping fellow Americans that have had a disaster and need support until they can be self-supporting. A Walk in Time

The 350 was introduced in 1965, the price was \$420.00, the 117XC, AC supply was \$95.00, the 14-117 12 VDC supply was \$130.00, and the VX-1 VOX kit was \$35.00. Power input on all bands, 10 to 80 meters, is better than 400 watts PEP on single sideband, and 230 watts dc input on CW. The basic 5 band transceiver includes AGC, ALC, and grid block CW keying.

The Swan 350, no doubt one of Swan's most popular series of transceivers, evolved over the years to the 350C, then into the 350B and 350D, the last of the line.

The most common power supply that was used with the Swan 350, and many other models, was the combination speaker / power supply which matched the unit. For home use, the 120 VAC units were the "117C", "117XC", and the model "412" DC supply for mobile use was available.

In 1965, if you were running this rig mobile with a power output of 200 watts plus and the Swan M-45 mobile antenna, you would have one of the top dog signals from your mobile station.

Another Successful MS-150 Bike tour:

The 18th Annual PA Dutch MS-150 Bike Tour took place on June 11th and 12th. This fundraising activity for the Multiple Sclerosis Society guided approximately 550 bicyclists over a scenic route from the Lehigh Valley Velodrome in Trexlertown to Kutztown University and back the next day, with 25-mile, 50-mile, 75-mile, and 100-mile options for riders with lesser or greater expectations. As has been the case for the past several years, members of the DLARC and other interested hams provided communications for event vehicles and locations over the entire route. The net control station, N3KU, was located at Kutztown University—thank you to Len, N2BSC, for helping us get a room at the University where we could have the Net Control center.



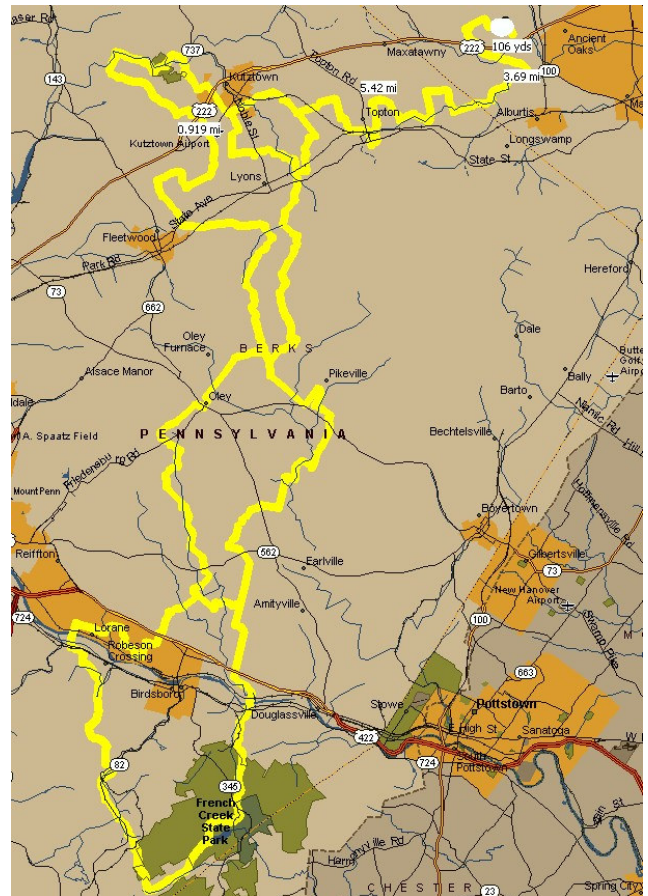

This year's event went smoothly, with no transports, and only one minor accident that we know of (a fall that resulted in some road rash). There was a little bit of excitement when a call came in reporting a possible case of heat stroke, and although we started moving the ambulance to that location, it ended up being a bad case of leg cramps, and the cyclist was picked up by a staff car. All communication traffic that went over the two repeaters used for the event was handled efficiently and courteously by all operators. I would like to extend Jeff's and my appreciation to the owners and users of the 146.700 repeater in Nazareth (W3OK) and the 147.180 repeater in Reading (WB3FPL) for allowing the use of their machines for more than twelve hours on each of the two day event. I would also like to thank the Selinsgrove repeater for working with us to resolve an interference problem that started Sunday between that repeater and the Reading repeater.

I want to mention and thank each one of the 20 hams and one non-ham that helped with this year's event. How to Operate a Radio

--from the Apr.6, 2005 ARRL Contest Rate Sheet

In this world of complexity and semi-intelligent radios and operators, we are often confronted with vexing situations of electronic recalcitrance. The following six steps are virtually guaranteed to solve almost any radio-related problem you may encounter, whether you realize it or not.

Step One - Approach the radio in a confident manner. This will give it the (frequently mistaken) idea that you know what you are doing. This will also impress anyone who happens to be looking over your shoulder and if the radio suddenly starts working, you will be credited with it. If this step fails, proceed to Step Two.

Step Two - Wave the manual at the radio. This will show everyone, and perhaps the radio, that you are at least somewhat familiar with the sources of knowledge. You will no doubt have to proceed to Step Three.

Step Three - In a forcible manner, recite Ohm's Law directly at the front panel. (Before you do this, refer to an old Handbook to be sure you still remember what Ohm's Law is for.) This may be a traumatic experience for most Extra Class hams, for both you and the radio, and should only be attempted after the first two steps fail.

Step Four - Perform "percussive maintenance" by jarring the radio slightly. This may require anything

from a three to six foot drop. Most repair shops prefer a concrete floor for this step. This is, of course, a drastic step and if it fails, you have no recourse other than to return it to the factory as "In Warranty", or, proceed to Step Five.

Step Five - Add at least one minor accessory to the power supply. This will put an added load on the unit and thereby increase your advantage over it. Should these five steps fail to work, you will have to proceed to six, the most drastic step of all, which is seldom used except as a final resort.

Step Six - THINK!
