The Mystery Power Supply is a Small Solar Panel

Because no wires can be connected between the foyer and interior of the bank, the circuit needs to be powered by a supply that will last at least 15 years. A small 6-volt solar panel will provide plenty of power if mounted on the foyer's window so that it faces outside. Since the circuit need only work during banking hours, darkness is not a concern.

How It Works




Figure 1. Solar powered infrared transmitter designed to send a signal to a receiver when S1 is briefly closed.

S1 is a floor switch in the lobby of Big Bucks Bank. The circuit in Fig. 1 drives a near-infrared LED with a stream of pulses when a visitor steps on and closes S1. The infrared pulses are directed toward a receiver that activates a chime when they are received. The frequency of the pulses is controlled by the 47K resistor and the capacitor. The 100 ohm resistor limits current through the LED.

SEPTEMBER PROGRAM



This month's program was Carole Perry / WB2MGP speaking on how she was able to recruit kids into amateur radio. Teaching the technology and code to generations of students attending her school in Staten island, New York. She worked this ham radio curriculum as a way to introduce science, math and geography to her students at the Intermediate School 72, in the Arts and Technology Department. This program introduced amateur radio to her students, the result of which, motivated children in all areas of the schools curricula. She related how she was told the the general ham population would never accept kids being on the air, because of turning the bands into CB radio. But that never became a factor. After 30 years of 15 classes of between 30 and 40 students in each

classes, each term, and these thousands of students experiencing QSOs. All this lead to Carole getting hundreds of youngsters licensed, and the support from the ham community. In these classes were non-English speaking children, special needs students and youngsters of varying levels of ability. But this instruction proved to be positive and the returns were unmeasurable. Her program has proved to be so successful that it has been used in other areas of the country, and with the same long term results. Her classes were able to hold QSOs with other schools around the country and how they exchanged local area gifts with these school. Also how they were also able to work the astronauts, both at the Johnson Space Center and while in orbit, first with the space capsules and later with the shuttles. As a result Carole became a World radio Magazine columnist, a Dayton Hamvention Youth forum leader, and head of the Radio Club of America Education Committee.

PROGRAM CHAIRMAN AND COMMITTEE

There is a need for a program committee and chairperson for the 2010 calendar year program scheduling. This job has been done by Pete / NL7XM for the past 2 years, but he can no longer devote the time necessary all by himself to properly secure talent and arrange scheduling of all the Club's Programs. A program chairperson can choose to put together their own series of programs or put together a committee do the same, distributing the work load over a group. The Executive Committee feels the high quality programs that Pete had supplied over the past year, has had some effect on the membership growth experienced over this period. And would like for this growth to continue. There will only need to be necessary to schedule eleven programs, since the balance of this year is taken care of and December 2010 is the annual Christmas get together. Programs do not need to be Ham radio related, the only requirement is that the programs be of interest to membership. Looking back over the 2009 programs, the variance of subjects cover a lot of interesting subjects.

PENNSYLVANIA QSO PARTY INFORMATION

The KQX Group is has been named the Bonus Station for the 2009 PA QSO Party. We will run an "old school" Multi-Multi from Wyoming County (WYO) using the call sign N3KAE. Our group has submitted the highest scores for the past two PQP's (2008 and 2007). We intend to give plenty of opportunities for you to add bonus points to your score this year. Our focus will be HF CW and SSB 160m to 20m due to the lack of solar activity. We will be on 15m and 10m CW and SSB for, at least, both high-band activity periods. We hope to devote more time on these band-modes. RTTY and PSK is planned for 80m-20m. Our 20m RTTY/PSK periods are planned for 1800z-1959z Saturday and Sunday. An additional hour extension (2059z) may occur depending upon digital demand. RTTY/PSK periods on 80m and 40m have yet to be determined. We intend to incorporate it for some time on Saturday and Sunday.

We opened a Facebook page. We will post the same information there as we do for this listserv. There may be a way for us to post additional information there like the planned county activity and planned mobile routes. I'll need to find out. The "unspecified-recipients" trick is used by spammers to push through emails and we don't want any spam flowing through the forum. So, if I find that your post has "unspecified-recipients" I will click the reject button and you will get a rejected message notice.

So, please remember that all posts to the DLARCforum should only have <u>dlarcforum@mailman.qth.net</u> in the TO: field.

OPINION: FIELD DAY – WHAT IT REALY IS!

From The ARRL, ARES E-Letter for August 19, 2009

The debate is always the same: "It's a contest!" argues half of all Field Day operators. "No, it's an emergency preparedness event," counters the other half. And so, back and forth it goes, year after year. I finally decided what Field Day is. Field Day clubs happily announce their procurement of a 50 foot communications van from their OEM, and reserve the sheltered pavilion on the ocean with rest rooms and BBQ grills. Their planning meetings start in January, a full six months ahead of the event. This is not realistic for an actual emergency. I live in south Florida, prone to disaster. When a communication crisis hits here, hams don't operate from pavilions, 50 foot air conditioned vans or even tents. Many end up in their own houses without commercial power nor outdoor antennas, which are blown down. If you want to practice your skills as a disaster communicator, then you need to participate in the annual SET (Simulated Emergency Test), a nationwide exercise in emergency communications, administered by Emergency Coordinators, District Emergency Coordinators, Section Emergency Coordinators and Net Managers. The SET weekend gives communicators the opportunity to focus on their emergencycommunications capability while interacting with NTS nets. Back to Field Day: Planners consider who is going to bring the chili, what software should be used for logging and what call sign would bring the most prestige. Does this sound like planning for an emergency? No. So Field Day must be a contest, right? Wrong. Even the most serious contest and Field Day operators admit that they are just out there to have fun. The camaraderie generated by getting the club and their families together to socialize is the main objective. Competition is not a priority. So what is Field Day, really? Field Day is our annual public relations event. Your PIO should be the most important player. He/she should be inviting local and county officials like the Emergency Manager, Fire Chief, Police Chief, County Sheriff, hospital administrators, CERT leaders, and representatives from ARES/RACES groups. The media should be invited. So should the public. Prepare press kits, exhibits and hands-on projects for the kids in attendance. And be prepared to deal with the public as much as you do with your food menu. Have a Tour Guide on hand, and an Information Table, easy-to-understand handouts, and well-spoken representatives to discuss our contributions to the community. We wonder why we heroes are so unsung. It's our own fault. We have to take advantage of the two days a year on Field Day when we can really blow our own horn - to let the public know we are here, what we do and why we do it. - Warren Rothberg, W4WR, former ARRL New Hampshire Section Manager and New England Division Vice Director
