FROM THE PRESIDENT'S SHACK

Before getting into this month's topic, I need to make a correction to last month's article on the milk-house. While discussing how Ken and Skip started the regular opening of the milk-house, I used the wrong call for Skip. The correct call for Skip is K3CC. So many calls, so little gray matter.

Moving on. On January 13, AI / W3CE and I met with the folks from Northampton County (emergency management, 911 center, facilities management) and Industrial Communications (Charlie Adams). This meeting was a follow-up to a meeting which AI and I had with County last year. At our meeting last year, we presented a number of issues that we felt would improve our interaction with, and utility to the county. The following is a review of the results of our most recent meeting.

With a number of managers working in the county system, it has been difficult to know the correct individual to contact for a particular issue. We will now have a single point of contact in Nick Tylenda, for all of our various issues with county.

On the subject of ID badges, we can provide photographs (JPEG files) and qualifications to county and they will produce the badges for us. We are awaiting specifications for the photographs.

Easton Hospital is establishing some amateur radio capability to be used as a backup in emergency situations. They were looking into packet radio. We suggested that it may be advisable for them to pursue D-star communications as that system is newer and is being implemented in other area hospitals. The issue with packet radio is "who would they be talking to". County will be discussing this with the hospital.

For some time, we have wanted to improve the antenna situation at the milk-house with the installation of a beam antenna. We initially thought that this would be placed on a tower that we would attach to the barn. However, after some discussion, it was decided that it would be best if the beam were placed on top of the 100 foot tower adjacent to the milk-house. It turns out that the antenna at the top of the tower is no longer needed and that space will be available. Because our beam and rotator are rather old (>15 years) and the expense of installation is significant (> \$3K - county would prefer a professional crew to do the installation), it was suggested that a new beam and rotator should be purchased. They also proposed that they would pay for (and own) the equipment and installation. We need to provide the information on the antenna and rotator, and perhaps fabricate the mounting plates. County will look into providing the funding. And, Industrial Communications will supervise the installation. I would anticipate that we would assist in the assembly of the antenna and installation where permissible.

While work is being done on the tower, we should look into repairing or replacing our existing wire antenna, and perhaps installing a pulley or two for additional antennas. We might also be able to move some of our existing antennas further up on the tower.

As for the milk-house, county will be removing the old Blue Mountain Control tapes, and will arrange for the repair of the ceiling. The key issuance has been resolved and we will provide county with a list of active members to help improve security. Charlie Adams said that Industrial Communications would look to consolidate some of the equipment racks with the goal of removing two or three racks. This should make getting around in the milk-house quite a bit easier. County mentioned that they would be removing the generator from the milk-house and that we would be able to use that space once it had been cleaned out and painted. They mentioned that they thought this could take some time (as they hadn't worked out the details of the removal) and that we shouldn't start measuring for drapery just yet.

We discussed the possibility of converting our existing 145.11 machine to a D-star repeater. While we anticipated just a 2M repeater, county inquired into the option of other frequencies (440MHz and 1.2GHz). We will provide them with additional information and they will look into funding of this change.

On the emergency communication front, we discussed getting an RF connection in the situation room. While they do not want any RF sources in the situation room, they will review the possibility of putting the radio in the existing transmitter shack and running a line for the control head into the situation room. We also reviewed the purpose of the command vehicle and the potential for RF connections for amateur radio.

We reviewed the ability to get older laptops spun off from county operations. They would like a set of minimum specifications for these in order to make sure that the laptops would serve our purposes.

There was an interest in having the club participate with county in various public relations events. We have done this in the past and indicated a willingness to continue to support these events.

We also discussed the possibility of providing support for "Project Life Saver". And no, it doesn't refer to the candies. Project Life Saver is a system designed to find individuals (primarily Alzheimer's patients) who wander off from a safe location. These individual wear an RF bracelet that enables them to be tracked should they wander off. It was noted that our "Fox hunting" skills would be useful in this endeavor. The county already owns some of the necessary equipment, and some of our members may be similarly equipped. We need to resolve liability issues, establish call-up and coordination procedures, and establish a trained reserve group of club members.

As you can see, we covered a lot of ground in the meeting. In addition to thanking the individuals at the meeting for taking the time to prepare and meet with us, I would also like to thank Barry / N3NVA for reviewing some of the issues with Industrial Communications. I am sure that his discussions with Charlie went a long way toward getting a beam on top of the tower and getting us some much needed additional space at the club station.

At this time, there are no hard and fast timetables for the various projects. Each of the projects requires different levels of support and planning from the parties involved. What we do have is a rather well defined set of goals and responsibilities. We will be looking forward to your help and will keep you informed as we complete the tasks ahead.

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DLARCforum USUAGE GUIDELINES

The DLARCforum is meant to be used to pass relevant information about the club, its activities, events and other amateur radio related topics. Round-table discussions are encouraged but please try to stay focused on the specific topic being discussed. You may advertise items for sale as long as they are amateur radio related.

Topics of general interest may be discussed but please be sure the topic is appropriate for the club forum and general membership. Please refrain from using the forum to discuss volatile topics unrelated to amateur radio. Occasional humorous anecdotes may be posted if relevant to the membership. However, the forum is not to be used as a "joke bulletin board".

If you are uncertain about posting any information that could possibly be inappropriate or controversial but has relevance to amateur radio or the membership then please contact the list administrator or an executive Committee member for advice and/or approval.

Please refrain from forwarding messages to the forum without verifying the accuracy and validity of the information. Many messages received from unsubstantiated sources concerning computer viruses, missing children, alleged scams, etc. that prompt you to "send this to everybody you know", often turn out to be highly inaccurate or complete and total hoaxes. Forwarding this type of information without verifying its authenticity and accuracy is irresponsible. (You should follow this guideline when forwarding any emails whether to the forum or the membership in general.)

The general rules of amateur radio concerning non-commercial usage also apply to the forum. It is not to be used for commercial purposes, solicitation for profit or personal gain (excluding sales of radio related equipment, etc.) by individuals or groups.

To avoid delays when posting messages to the forum, please remember to configure your email program to send "plain text" messages. You can usually find this setting in the options or configuration section of your particular email software.

You can only post messages to the forum using the email address which is subscribed. If you subscribed from your home computer using your home email address and attempt to post a message from your work computer using your work email address or any other computer with a different email address it will be rejected. However you can subscribe multiple addresses if you wish to use multiple systems.

Messages posted to the DLARCforum must have the address in the "TO" line. Postings with the address in the "CC", or "BCC" lines will be rejected.

As a general rule, if you post a message and you don't get your message back, via the DLARCforum (after a short processing delay) then it probably was rejected. The system may send you an automated message if it can determine why your post was rejected or you may get a message from the list administrator stating the reason for the rejection. If you are having difficulty posting or receiving messages, please contact the list administrator.



WHAT SHOULD EVERY HAM KNOW HOW TO DO?

On the HamRadioHelpGroup mailing list, there was recently a discussion about using modulated CW on 2m. One fellow pointed out that MFJ sold a unit that would do this. When I pointed out that this box cost \$100 and that they could do exactly the same thing with the \$18 PicoKeyer from HamGadgets.Com, I got some flack that the PicoKeyer was a kit, and that some people might not be able to build it.

I pointed out that a couple of years ago our club held a construction night, and that several people who had never soldered before successfully completed the kit. I also pointed out that even if the ham didn't have the proper tools, he or she could purchase a soldering iron, needle-nose pliers, and diagonal cutters, in addition to the kit, for less than \$100.

I don't know if that convinced him, but it got me thinking about what a ham should be able to do. This is the list I've come up with so far:

- 1. Solder. Every ham should know how to solder a connection, and by extension, build small kits and cables. Over the course of one's ham career, this skill will save you a ton of time and money.
- 2. Build a dipole antenna. The dipole is the simplest and most versatile antenna. Knowing how to build one and use one is an essential skill.
- 3. Check into a net. Net operation is one of the most basic operating skills.
- 4. Use a multimeter to measure voltage, current, and resistance and know what those measurements mean. This is the most basic skill used in troubleshooting, and at some point or another, you're going to have to troubleshoot something.

This list does, of course, imply that a ham is physically capable of doing them. I would not expect hams that are physically disabled to be able to do everything on this list.

After I posted this to my blog (www.kb6nu.com), I got several good responses. Jeff said, "I believe hams should know how to install RF connectors, particularly the three most used in our hobby, the PL-259, the BNC, and the N connector." Blair, WB3AWI, replied, "Another thing that hams should know how to do is to measure the SWR of an antenna."

3rd ANNUAL DLARC SPRINT

Previously held in March, but several changes were necessary, including the date, which is **SATURDAY, FEBRUARY 27, 2010.** Same time, however, 10AM to 11AM, local time. Still for DLARC members only. On 2 meter simplex channels only. [[The first year we had 14 entries. Last year we picked up 12 more, but, 7 of the original 14 didn't enter. So, you can see, we could have at least 26, but, why not more??]] One contact per station, regardless of frequency. This is single operator only. You can operate Mobile part of the time and from home part time, all on one entry. Hand written logs to be submitted at the March 4th meeting, however the winner will not be announced and award presented until the April 1st meeting.

Now comes the interesting change, log keeping and exchange. You will note that the serial number has been dropped, and we will no longer use the birthday number. Instead we will use a **CHECK** sequence consisting of 2 digits and 2 letters. The 2 digit number will be from either your house number or P.O. box number. That's the last 2 digits only, followed by the first 2 letters of your middle name. (If your house number is 1234, you give 34. Same with the P.O. box number. If yours is only one digit then put a zero ahead of it. If you have neither then pick a number.) If your house number is 13579 and your middle name is Ambrose, then your CHECK Sequence would be 79AM. No middle name? then use NM. So, the exchange is:= CALL CHECK NAME Your log must show TIME as well. The top of your log sheet must show your Call, Check Sequence, and name sent.

HELPFUL HINTS FOR YOUR CAR IN THE WINTER

Keep your headlights clear with car wax! Just wipe ordinary car wax on your headlights. It contains special water repellents that will prevent that messy mixture from accumulating on your lights - lasts 6 weeks.

2010 CENSUS TO BEGIN

THIS IS PRETTY BASIC ADVICE; Be Cautious About Giving Info to Census Workers

With the U.S. Census process beginning, the Better Business Bureau (BBB) advises people to be cooperative, but cautious, so as not to become a victim of fraud or identity theft. The first phase of the 2010 U.S.. Census is under way as workers have begun verifying the addresses of households across the country. Eventually, more than 140,000 U.S. Census workers will count every person in the United States and will gather information about every person living at each address including name, age, gender, race, and other relevant data.

The big guestion is - how do you tell the difference between a U.S. Census worker and a con artist? BBB offers the following advice:

If a U.S. Census worker knocks on your door, they will have a badge, a handheld device, a Census Bureau canvas bag, and a confidentiality notice. Ask to see their identification and their badge before answering their questions. However, you should never invite anyone you don't know into your home.

Census workers are currently only knocking on doors to verify address information. Do not give your Social Security number, credit card or banking information to anyone, even if they claim they need it for the U.S. Census.

REMEMBER, NO MATTER WHAT THEY ASK, YOU REALLY ONLY NEED TO TELL THEM HOW MANY PEOPLE LIVE AT YOUR ADDRESS.

While the Census Bureau might ask for basic financial information, such as a salary range, YOU DON'T HAVE TO ANSWER ANYTHING AT ALL ABOUT YOUR FINANCIAL SITUATION. The Census Bureau will not ask for Social Security, bank account, or credit card numbers, nor will employees solicit donations. Any one asking for that information is NOT with the Census Bureau.

AND REMEMBER, THE CENSUS BUREAU HAS DECIDED NOT TO WORK WITH ACORN ON GATHERING THIS INFORMATION.. No Acorn worker should approach you saying he/she is with the Census Bureau.

Eventually, Census workers may contact you by telephone, mail, or in person at home. However, the Census Bureau will not contact you by Email, so be on the lookout for Email scams impersonating the Census.

Never click on a link or open any attachments in an Email that are supposedly from the U.S. Census Bureau. For more advice on avoiding identity theft and fraud, visit www.bbb.org

INTERNET SOCIAL NETWORKS INTERTWINE WITH HAM RADIO

How many of you 217 members have an account and actively use internet social network services? Come on raise your hands. For you older than 50's years in age you might be asking what is that? Before I state the long definition, you might want to grab a aspirin first to go with your coffee, hopefully being poured into a D.L.A.R.C mug. OK, you can lower your hand now.

It focuses on enabling virtual communities that for the building and reflecting of social networks or social relationships among people who share interests and/or activities. Essentially consists of a representation of each user (often a profile), his/her social links, and a variety of additional services.

Most ISN's are web based and allow for online communities to be created so that users can interact over the internet, such as e-mail, instant messaging and bulletin board services. I know for sure at least 40 of you have already used at least one ISN named Facebook because the D.L.A.R.C homepage is found there. Another ISN domain you should place into your browser favorite list is http://www.73s.org, it's known as the Facebook for Hams which has a community of over 1,772 ham radio operators. Here you can communicate with the world, find, follow, and track amateur radio friends. You can post photos and blogs while linking into your existing YouTube, Flickr, and Twitter accounts! You can also log QSOs online and look-up repeaters, clubs, and Ham events- even DX cluster traffic and ARPS status of fellow hams. They even have Podcast content called ICQ, Practical Amateur Radio and Resonant Frequency. There are other domains on the net in which you can stay connected through status updates while following breaking amateur radio news. One that I found is called HamFeed.com that acts like a ham repeater for Twitter and 73s.org users. After dwelling on it for awhile I truly believe that ISN's will provide hams with a new generation of powerful tool applications to help aid amateurs with our hobby from this point on. But the first step to this success will have to be amateurs not being procrastinators. We first need to educate ourselves first with these new services. We need to embrace and take full advantage of them today rather then tomorrow.

My main interest now is television Dxing. I normally can be found on the 2005 Bob's Radio Web, TvFmSkip Log at Dxworld.com, a collection of interactive pages for Dxers. Here I can post real-time ionospheric condition alerts or chat when conditions are not that favorable.

The above site is a great resource with all it's useful links if you have a net connection while your in the field or mobile using your portable PC that has a web browser to access the link.

What do you do if you do not have that option but would like to communicate when tropospheric and sporadic-e exists at your location in real-time?

That is when Twitter fills the gap, a free micro-blogger that is a short message service that works over multiple networks in real-time. As their header logo states - "Share and discover what's happening right now, anywhere in the world". Here is my tweet: http://twitter.com/GACTVDX

If you have cell phone service, then you just found the answer. To use it with your phone you will first have to download a client service application(s).

Once the alert are issued using both TvFmSkip Log and Twitter and television Dx starts to appear on the screen I will video record the event with a camcorder. Later it will be uploaded to Youtube.com which everyone knows by this time is a video sharing website on which users can built their own channel to upload and share videos with the world. After that's completed, a copy of the video will be archived on a site know as Arkiva.com, a secure off-site file storage, sharing, and media conversion. Basically a online cyber home that is a free service with up to 2Gb of space for your hobby group page. Their header logo is "All your Digital Files. One Place". It also offers free email. Go ahead and give these new services a try, use your imagination on how we can intertwine ISN's with our radio hobbies to be more efficient and productive.
