

13 COLONIES SPECIAL EVENT WEBINAR

We will be hosting a special Zoom Webinar on June 15th for the 13 Colonies Special Event.

The annual Original 13 Colonies Special Event will mark its 12th anniversary this year. The event gets under way on July 1 at 1300 UTC and runs through July 8 at 0400 UTC. Special event stations with 1 × 1 call signs will represent the original 13 US colonies, including K2M in Pennsylvania, plus bonus stations WM3PEN in Philadelphia and GB13COL in Durham, England. Participating stations try to contact at least one or all 13 Colony Stations plus the two bonus stations. Earn a nice certificate and collect unique QSL cards.

WM3PEN trustee, Bob Josuweit, WA3PZO, will talk about the 13 Colonies Special Event and WM3PEN's participation over the past 10 years, and efforts to get hams, who do not have HF capability, involved with special event operations. He will also discuss how incoming QSL card requests have opened up doors to talk about ham radio to people who are not familiar with the hobby.

RADIO AMATEUR FINDS ANOTHER "ZOMBIE SATELLITE"

British Columbia radio amateur Scott Tilley, VE7TIL, has found another "zombie satellite," as he calls them. This time, he tracked and identified radio signals from the experimental UHF military communication satellite LES-5. Tilley says he found the satellite in what he called a geostationary "graveyard" orbit after noting a modulated carrier on 236.7487 MHz.

"Most zombie satellites are satellites that are no longer under human control, or have failed to some degree," Tilley National Public Radio (NPR) earlier this month. It's not clear whether LES-5 is still capable of receiving commands.

LES-5 was built by MIT's Lincoln Laboratory and launched in 1967 as part of the military's Tactical Satellite Communication Program. It was supposed to shut down in 1972, but it continues to operate as long as its solar panels are facing the sun.

What intrigued Tilley about LES-5 was that it might be the oldest functioning geostationary satellite in space. After British Columbia went on lockdown due to the COVID-19 pandemic, Tilley found himself with a lot of free time for such a search. He located LES-5 on March 24.

From his home in Roberts Creek, British Columbia, Tilley, an amateur astronomer, routinely scans the skies for radio signals from classified objects orbiting Earth. Since he started, he's located dozens of secret or unlisted satellites.

In 2018, while hunting for an undisclosed US government spacecraft lost in a launch mishap, he spotted the signature of IMAGE (Imager for Magnetopause-to-Aurora Global Exploration), a NASA spacecraft believed to have died in December 2005. The discovery delighted space scientists. NASA and another ham in the UK confirmed his

finding. Launched in 2000 on a mission to monitor space weather, IMAGE mapped plasma patterns around Earth.

MAY PROGRAM REPORT POWER LINE INFERENCE DETECTIVE Mark / W3BQA

The presentation began with the explanation of what is considered yours that what is considered your power companies service to your home. The power companies responsibility ends at the weatherhead which is where the line from the pole connect to the line that feed your meter.

When you have a noise issue the first thing to do is ask yourself does the problem occur in wet or dry weather, what time of day, and does the wind seem to be causing the change?

To begin your search for your noise problem a good piece of equipment for troubleshooting is a portable AM radio. What you do is tune, the radio to the middle of the noise band and use that setting for your search. To do a inside the house search, switch off breakers one at a time and see if the noise disappears, if it does leave it off and continue on to the next breaker. If you silence a noise like turning off the breaker continue checking because maybe more than one breaker is creating the situation. After you locate the bad breaker, locate what is on that circuit using the radio, check by unplugging the items on that circuit.

Outside problems usually are not usually caused by the transform, but by connected lines leading into and away from the transformer. This is usually caused by damage or deterioration to the connectors and lines themselves. Also because multiple houses are usually connected to one transformer, and these other homes could have a noise problem and feeding back into your home.

When you find the outside source of your noise note the location and number of the pole, and reported to your local electric company.

As a ham when looking for problems, they are usually nearby your cutie gauge and often easy to locate. And the last thing,don't .over think the problem.

Mark ended with the usual question-and-answer session. A real informative program, you don't know what you missed by not ZOOMing in!

ARRL SUGGESTS TAKING A CREATIVE APPROACH TO FIELD DAY 2020

This year, ARRL Field Day promises to be a unique iteration of this annual event, with many individuals and groups coming up with new and interesting ways to adjust their approach. As an event, Field Day is structured to be versatile and can be adapted for any situation.

Many groups have asked how they can adjust their Field Day planning to address social-distancing guidelines that may be in effect in many areas of the country, as gathering at their traditional Field Day site may not be feasible or safe. Instead of participating in a group event this year, consider operating as a Class B, C, D, or E station, utilizing your own call sign.

ARRL will include club names for all participating stations in the published results, so the efforts of your club's members can be acknowledged. While we will not publish an aggregate club score, seeing the name of your club associated with various individual member's results is certainly a way to highlight your club's activity.

Myriad opportunities are possible in this year's Field Day setting. A few options are as follows:

-Consider having an intra-club competition among members, seeing who can make the most contacts during the Event. You can award prizes or distribute certificates at a club meeting. This can be a fun way to bolster the activities of individual club members, even though they cannot all gather together at the same location this year.

-Set up a Field Day Challenge with rival clubs in neighboring communities. See how many members of each club get 0n the air from their own stations and participate in the event. In addition to "bragging rights," perhaps

One club is planning to conduct its Field Day as a 4A club group, with participants spaced to comply with social distancing guidelines within the required 1,000-foot-diameter circle and operating individual stations. This club also plans to set up a "Get on the Air" (GOTA) station. The club's plan is to have the GOTA coach at the Field Day site, while GOTA operators participate via remote link.

Another club is planning to set up a remote-controlled station at its usual Field Day site, with club members taking turns controlling the station from their homes. The club is developing a schedule that outlines when each member of the club will be at the helm via the remote link.

Whatever approach you take to this year's Field Day, keep up to date with the current guidelines issued by local and state health agencies that may impact your proposed operations.

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FROM THE JUNE 1964 SPARK GAP TIMES

(This short story in a series of articles about Charles Ellsworth, an early Marconi operator aboard ship in 1913 is reprinted with permission. -NL7XM)

I was offered a one-trip relief radioman's job on the old SS Bermudian, a British ship running between New York and Bermuda. This was my first assignment to a British passenger liner as a wireless operator and there were differences. In most of my previous jobs aboard ship I had eaten with the crew. Now I was told I would have to wear a white suit and would sit at the head of a table in the first class dining salon. I would also have the exclusive use of a room steward, or valet, who served tea in the wireless room every afternoon at 3PM, and took care of my clothes and even shined my shoes!

I picked up a white uniform coat with three wide gold stripes on it at a hock shop for \$5 and bought three pairs of white pants, and a pair of white shoes. When I boarded the ship, my entire wealth consisted of \$3.00.

The SS Bermuda passenger list included the elite of New York City on Bermuda vacations. After departing New York, the bugle blew for dinner at 7pm. I arrived in the first class dining salon looking like Naval Aristocracy. I was escorted to my own table with all passengers looking on and wondering who this high ranking officer was. I had seven people at my table which included the President of the Morgan Bank and other wealthy brokers from Wall Street.

When I started to sit down, the passengers at my table rose to introduce themselves. The passengers at my table were discussing railroads and bridges and I went right along with them. After the finger bowl had been served, the President of Morgan Bank asked me if they could get the closing stock prices for certain stocks. I invited them up the the wireless room and called the New York Herald wireless station and requested the closing prices.

After I had furnished the information, the Morgan Bank President reached inside his pocket and took out a \$20 dollar bill and handed it to my valet in appreciation for services rendered. After the passengers left the wireless room, we split the \$20.00, which represented an entire week's salary!

I only made one trip on the old Bermuda, and the Captain told me at the gangway should I again come aboard as a wireless operator, to leave the Admiral's uniform ashore!"
