THE PROPER WAY TO SEND TRAFFIC BY VOICE

What happens if you're in an emergency situation that needs traffic to be passed and you don't have any digital equipment or Internet available? Do you know what to do? Do you know how to properly pass traffic by voice to someone who will pass that information on to the proper authorities by better means than what you have available? These are very interesting questions and it can be a situation that many Hams will face at one time or another. What I want to do is give our club members a lesson on how to properly pass traffic over the air with less mistakes. Traffic should be factual, concise, brief, and to the point to be passed on to the proper authorities. This is something that takes practice and should be practice on our Wednesday night nets so that when the situation arises, everybody will be ready and will know how to do it correctly which will cut down on useless time making mistakes. Always remember that "Time and Correct Information" is the most important thing when it comes to passing traffic.

When sending traffic to someone by voice so that the traffic can be passed on for whatever reason, always use the International Phonetic Alphabet. Don't use the fancy ones you hear on the radio. That's not proper procedures. It only makes the person copying your traffic have to stop and think of what you just spelled which he will miss other words in the message, Which in turns makes the traffic not get out in a proper fashion. Any delay with getting traffic out is vital and could cause undue problems. So learn to use the International Phonetic Alphabet. Here is the Alphabet: Alpha, Bravo, Charlie, Delta, Echo,, Foxtrot, Gulf, Hotel, India, Juliet, Kilo, Lima, Mike, November, Oscar, Papa, Quebec, Romeo, Sierra, Tango, Uniform, Victor, Whiskey, X-ray, Yankee, and Zulu. Get use to using this Alphabet when doing any contesting. It will help the operator to get your callsign correct. When you don't understand another station's callsign, ask him if his callsign is right the way you copied it by repeating his callsign the proper way. If that's done enough, maybe other Hams will start using the correct Phonetic Alphabet. The most important thing to remember and practice is passing traffic at writing speed and not reading speed. As you are reading your message, just imagine yourself writing it as you're speaking. Don't go overboard with reading it real slow. Speak clearly and precise. The more you send traffic by voice, the easier it gets. Speaking slowly helps the person copying your message and will also be able to keep up without making mistakes. Another addition to help send traffic by voice is the phrase "I Spell". This phrase is used at any time when the information you are trying to transmit by voice can be confused or it extraordinary, or when communications are difficult. The English words, 'TO', 'TWO', and 'TOO' all sound the same when spoken. Each, however, has a different meaning, and the context of the sentence in which they are found many not clearly indicate which work is intended. Likewise, the words 'HERE' and 'HEAR' can easily be confused when spoken. For those cases, and, in all cases where the information you're trying to convey may not be clear, (such as in the case with some names) we use the word, I SPELL. Here is an example text: "GLAD TO HEAR FROM YOU TOO. IT'S TOO NICE TO LEAVE". When using the words, I SPELL, first say the word, then use I SPELL, then spell the word using the correct Phonetic Alphabet, then say the word again. Confused? Here's what the sample text that was sent sounds like if it was communicated on a voice net. "GLAD TO <u>I SPELL TANGO OSCAR</u> TO HEAR <u>I SPELL HOTEL ECHO ALPHA ROMEO</u> HEAR FROM YOU TOO I SPELL TANGO OSCAR OSCAR TOO PERIOD ITS TOO I SPELL TANGO

OSCAR OSCAR TOO NICE HERE I SPELL HOTEL ECHO ROMEO ECHO HERE TO I SPELL TANGO OSCAR TO LEAVE PERIOD"

Another time to use the words **I SPELL** is when the word you're trying to communicate can't (or, can't easily) be pronounced, such as in often the case with unusual names. Finally, another case in which the words, **I SPELL** will be used is in the case of abbreviations.

Example: "I AM AT HOME. CALL ME ASAP."

It will be communicated as follows;

"I AM AT HOME PERIOD CALL ME <u>I SPELL ALPHA SIERRA ALPHA PAPA</u> PERIOD" Now to go over what we just did, use the words **I SPELL** when:

- 1. There are several forms of the spoken word (to, two, too, here, hear, etc.)
- 2. You don't know how to pronounce the word or words.
- 3. Communicating abbreviations
- 4. Communications is difficult requiring words to be spelled out for the sake of communication reliability and efficiency.

Just as the word, **I SPELL**, are used to communicate words, the word **FIGURE** is used to communicate numbers or groups of numbers. You never know if or when you will run into numbers in a voice sent message. Precede each number with the word, **FIGURES**. Here is an example: "CALL ME AT 4388201"

This is how you would communicate, using the word, **FIGURES**:

"CALL ME AT <u>FIGURES FOUR THREE EIGHT EIGHT TWO ZERO ONE</u>" You don't need to spell the "TWO" since you already said Figures.

Here's another example: "I HAVE BEEN HERE 23 DAYS"

Communicate like this:

"I HAVE BEEN HERE <u>I SPELL HOTEL ECHO</u>, <u>ROMEO</u> HERE <u>FIGURES TWO THREE</u> DAYS" Again, since it was said **FIGURES**, there is no need to spell TWO.

There may at some time where we need to give an address to send a message to. The simple rule to apply when communicating these mixed groups by voice is to the appropriate word according to the first character of the mixed group. If the mixed group starts with a letter, use the word **I SPELL**. If the group begins with a number, use the word **FIGURES**.

Here are some examples: "123A 2ND STREET"

Transmitted by voice:

"FIGURES ONE TWO THERE ALPHA FIGURES TWO NOVEMBER DELTA STREET"

Text: "BUILDING A12"

Transmitted by voice: "BUILDING I SPELL ALPHA ONE TWO"

Another thing you may run into sending messages by voice is Roman numerals. When you encounter Roman numerals, you use the word **FIGURES ROMAN**.

Here is an example: "JOHN T. SMITH III"

Transmitted by voice:

"JOHN INITIAL TANGO SMITH FIGURES ROMAN THREE"

The last thing to go over is **PUNCTUATION IN TEXT**. The simple rule to follow when transmitting punctuation by voice is to the word. Use the words period, comma, colon, semi-colon, exclamation mark, etc. Occasionally, you will also encounter, parentheses and quotation marks. The left parenthesis is pronounced: "**PAREN**", while the right parenthesis is pronounced, "**UNPAREN**". Likewise, the first quotation mark encountered in a text is pronounced a "**QUOTE**", and the second is transmitted as "**UNQUOTE**". The hyphen is pronounced (always) as "**DASH**". The symbol "/" is pronounced as "**SLANT**". Here are some examples: "THANKS. PACKAGE, PHOTOS FOLLOW."

As transmitted by voice:

"THANKS PERIOD PACKAGE COMMA PHOTOS FOLLOW PERIOD

Example: "THAT IS GREAT! SUGGESTED NAME: "GENE"

Transmitted by voice:

"THAT IS GREAT <u>EXCLAMATION POINT</u> SUGGUSED NAME <u>COLON QUOTE</u> GENE <u>I</u>
<u>SPELL GOLF ECHO NOVEMBER ECHO</u> GENE <u>UNQOUTE</u>"

It takes time to get use to send messages by voice, but it's better to know how to before you are faced with no digital capabilities because of power outage. You can still power any radio by car battery if need be. If you have no computer, you're out of luck with sending important traffic.

I think that there should be traffic passing and traffic taken by voice to better our communication skills.

Hope everyone enjoyed this as much as I did putting it together. In the Navy-Marine Corps MARS we practice this all the time. As the Northeast Area Training Officer, I use to send lots of messages during our Emergency Training Exercises to get members use to doing it and copying traffic by voice. This technique was used on 9-11 with the Southern New York NAVMARCOR MARS members in sending out information from the Twin Towers situation because there was no power available to set up computers for digital modes. The Virginia NAVMARCOR MARS was also on stand-by ready to pass unclassified message if it was needed.

DLARC ARRL MEMBERSHIP UPDATE

This is an update of how the DLARC ARRL Membership is going. I still only have 25 members that informed me that they are ARRL Members. Like I said before in order to continue to be an Affiliated Club, you need to have at least 51% of the voting members be Full Members of the ARRL and are licensed radio amateurs. As far as being a Special Service club, the club must have an up-to-date ARRL Affiliation record.

I need club members to let me know if they haven't yet, that they're ARRL members. All I need to know if you're Life or Full members and the date of your renewal which you can find on your address label on your QST. If you're not an ARRL Member and would like to become one, feel free to contact me at n3iga@ptd.net and I will be glad to help you.

I have a spread sheet of all the DLARC members that I keep update on who's an ARRL member and whose isn't according to my records. I check the spread sheet the beginning of each month to see who needs to be reminded of their renewal. Then I send the Form for renewing through DLARC to the member. Just fill out the information, if paying by check, make sure you make it out to ARRL and not DLARC, and then mail it to me. If paying by credit card or with a Debit card, you can email it back to me or send it to me through the mail. Email me your request for my mailing address.

Remember that the DLARC gets a commission on new and renew membership which will help the club out. De John, N3IGA

The following repeaters Dstar repeaters are available in the Lehigh Valley. W3OK -145.11000MHz -0.600 Port C - W3OI -147.16500MHz +0.600 Port C, - W3OI - 445.02500MHz -5.000 Port B All repeaters on the net are linked through **Reflector 020 port A**, so all stations checking into the net should make sure that they have their local repeater call sign followed by the letter "G" in the eight positions of the RPT2 field. Otherwise, you will only be heard locally and not over the Reflector. Dongle users wishing to check into the net should Log On by connecting directly to Reflector 20, port A, rather than through your local repeater to conserve local bandwidth.
