# AUGUST MEETING PROGRAM



George / N3SQD presented "PIC Programing". PIC is a family of Harvard architecture microcontrolers made by , derived Microchip Technology, originally developed by General Instrument's Microelectronics Division. The name PIC initially referred to "Peripheral Interface Controller".

PICs are popular with both industrial developers and hobbyists alike due to their low cost, wide availability, large user base, extensive collection of application notes, availability of low cost or free development tools, and serial programming (and re-programming with flash memory) capability.

George demonstrated how with a perf board some 22 gauge wire and various PIC how cheap and easy controls could be made for various applications. His demonstration included a flashing LED and a constant time temperature read out. Also how depending on the use a PIC processor could be cheap and also expensive, your application would determine the actual cost.

# NEW DXCC ENTITY

The Republic of South Sudan Is Now a DXCC Entity

At 10:18 AM (EDT) on Thursday, July 14, the UN General Assembly met to vote on whether or not to admit the Republic of South Sudan as its 193rd member state. The Republic of South Sudan was unanimously admitted and is now a member of the United Nations; a two-thirds majority is needed to become a member of the UN.

Immediately following the General Assembly meeting, the flag of the Republic of South Sudan flew for the first time in front of the UN, ceremoniously marking its membership in the UN.

Now that the Republic of South Sudan is a member of the United Nations, the new country is now a DXCC entity by way of Section II, 1(a) of the DXCC rules. The DXCC Desk will begin immediately accepting QSOs for this new entity, with a start date of July 14, 2011.

According to DXCC Manager Bill Moore, NC1L, the Honor Roll numbers move from 340 to 341 for the Top of the Honor Roll, and for Honor Roll it becomes 332. "The deadline for the Honor Roll and annual listings is December 31, so you must submit the new entity to DXCC by then in order to retain your Honor Roll status," Moore explained.

"For Logbook of The World (LoTW), you may submit all your QSOs with the Republic of South Sudan stations anytime. There is no need to hold them out of your log or do anything differently from what you already have been doing. You do not need to assign country names or identifiers. After we issue certificates to the Republic of South Sudan license holders, LoTW will make matches and assign the correct entities automatically."

As of July 14, the International Telecommunication Union (ITU) has not announced a prefix block for the Republic of South Sudan.

# **COFFEE FILTERS**

# Better than paper towels and a lot less expensive...

# Who knew! And you can buy 1,000 at the Dollar Tree for \$1.00, even the large ones.

- 1. Cover bowls or dishes when cooking in the microwave. Coffee filters make excellent covers.
- 2. Clean windows, mirrors, and chrome... Coffee filters are lint-free so they'll leave windows sparkling.
- 3. Protect China by separating your good dishes with a coffee filter between each dish.
- 4. Filter broken cork from wine. If you break the cork when opening a wine bottle, filter the wine through a coffee filter.
- 5. Protect a cast-iron skillet. Place a coffee filter in the skillet to absorb moisture and prevent rust.
- 6. Apply shoe polish. Ball up a lint-free coffee filter.
- 7. Recycle frying oil. After frying, strain oil through a sieve lined with a coffee filter.
- 8. Weigh chopped foods. Place chopped ingredients in a coffee filter on a kitchen scale.
- 9. Hold tacos. Coffee filters make convenient wrappers for messy foods.
- 10 Stop the soil from leaking out of a plant pot. Line a plant pot with a coffee filter to prevent the soil from going through the drainage holes.
- 11. Prevent a Popsicle from dripping. Poke one or two holes as needed in a coffee filter.
- 12. Do you think we used expensive strips to wax eyebrows? Use strips of coffee filters..
- 13. Put a few in a plate and put your fried bacon, French fries, chicken fingers, etc on them.. It soaks out all the grease.
- 14. Keep in the bathroom. They make great "razor nick fixers."
- 15. As a sewing backing. Use a filter as an easy-to-tear backing for embroidering or appliqueing soft fabrics.
- 16. Put baking soda into a coffee filter and insert into shoes or a closet to absorb or prevent odors.

- 18 Use a coffee filter to prevent spilling when you add fluids to your car.

# MALPELO DXPEDITION TO GET UNDERWAY IN JANUARY 2012

The **HK0NA DXpedition to Malpelo** -- an island located approximately 235 miles from Colombia's Pacific coast -- is scheduled for January 22-February 6, 2012. Organized by the DX Radio Amateur Club (**DXARC**) out of Colombia, the DXpedition boasts an international team of 16 operators from eight countries. Malpelo is currently #12 on **DX Magazine**'s **100 Most Needed Countries Survey**.

According to DXpedition leader Jorge Prieto, HK1R, the HK0NA Team will depart from Buenaventura, Colombia on January 22 for the boat trip to Malpelo. Depending on sea and landing conditions, they expect to be on the air within 36 hours after landing on Malpelo. They will be using SSB, CW and Digital modes on 160-6 meters. Operations are planned on 160-6 meters on CW, SSB and Digital modes, including EME.

Malpelo is an uninhabited island, except for a small military post manned by the Colombian Army, which was established in 1986. Visitors to the island need a written permit from the Colombian Ministry of Ecology. In July 2006, Malpelo was declared a natural World Heritage Site by UNESCO. In 1969, 12 radio amateurs -- including then-ARRL President Bob

#### Dennison, W0DX/VP2VI (SK) -- undertook a DXpedition to Malpelo Island where they encountered pirates and sharks. THE MAYONNAISE JAR

# VANITY CALL SIGN FEE TO GO UP IN SEPTEMBER

On August 10, the FCC announced via a *Final Rule* in the *Federal Register* that the cost of an Amateur Radio vanity call sign will increase 90 cents, from to \$13.30 to \$14.20. The new fees take effect 30 days after publication, making September 9, 2011, the first day the new fee is in effect. Earlier this year, the FCC **released** a *Notice of Proposed Rulemaking and Order* (*NPRM*), seeking to raise the fee for Amateur Radio vanity call signs.

"The Commission tries to keep the regulatory fee for Vanity call signs as minimal as possible," explained the FCC in its *Final Rule*. "Between FY 2007 and FY 2010, the regulatory fee for Vanity call signs increased from \$1.17 (per year) to \$1.33 (per year), an increase of \$0.16 per year or \$1.60 over a ten-year license period. We do not believe this increase is inequitable, and the Commission will continue its efforts to keep this fee as minimal as possible. The fees that are collected from Vanity call signs are used to offset the cost of monitoring and researching new call sign requests to prevent the issuance of duplicate call signs."

The vanity call sign fee has fluctuated over the 14 years of the current program -- from a low of \$11.70 in 2007 to a high of \$70 (as first proposed in the FCC's 1994 *Report and Order*). In FY 2011, the FCC expects to grant 14,600 vanity call signs, bringing in \$207,320 from the vanity call sign program, and looks to recover a total of \$336,599,048 in fees from all the Services that it regulates.

The vanity call sign regulatory fee is payable not only when applying for a new vanity call sign, but also upon renewing a vanity call sign for a new term. The first vanity call sign licenses issued under the current Amateur Radio vanity call sign program that began in 1996 came up for renewal five years ago. The FCC is authorized by the *Communications Act of 1934, As Amended*, to collect vanity call sign fees to recover the costs associated with that program.

# THE STORY BEHIND THE STORY OF PENICILLIN

Everyone knows that the Scottish scientist Alexander Fleming discovered penicillin in some moldy bread in his laboratory at St Mary's Hospital in London. Penicillin was one of the first antibiotics discovered and is still one of the most widely used to combat bacterial infection. Although the story of Fleming's discovery is true, he wasn't the first to observe the beneficial effects of penicillin, which is derived from the penicillium fungi commonly found in mold.

Bread with blue mold growing on it was used to treat infected wounds during the middle ages – Arabian stable masters, for example, used it to cure sores on horses. In 1896, a French medical student named Ernest Duchesne submitted a paper on penicillin's healing properties to the Institute Pasteur, but his findings were ignored because of his youth. A Costa Rican doctor Clodomiro Picado Twight, reported similar observations on the4 effects of the Penicillium fungi in treating infections, but his discovery won little attention.

On September 28, 1928, Fleming noticed blue-green mold growing on a plate of Staphylococcus bacteria that had been left open. The mold produced a halo of inhibited bacterial growth from which Fleming concluded that the mold contained a substance that resisted the bacteria.

It wasn't until the 1940's though, that the active ingredient in Penicillium was identified and the doctors began using it to treat infections.

# AMAZING, SUPER-TOUGH SPIDER SILK OF MADAGASCAR

Madagascar, off the coast of eastern Africa, is the fourth biggest island in the world. There, large female golden orb spiders (found throughout the Tropics) weave giant webs of lustrous saffron silk fibers that are 5 to 6 times stronger than high-grade steel of the same weight, and about as strong as Kevlar that is used for body armor. Spider silk is super-strong but lightweight, and stretchable to about 40% of its length. Believe it or not, about a pound of its fine filament would encircle the entire globe. Spider silk is believed to have antiseptic properties and has been used to heal wounds.

Supposedly, in 1710, a wealthy Frenchman collected enough spider silk to produce "an entire suit of clothes for king Louis XIV." Sporadically, spider silk has been used by Indo-Pacific fishermen for simple nets and line. Though time-to-time there is grand hoopla, so far commercial attempts to replicate spider silk have mostly failed. Currently there is only one known example of cloth made from spider silk. It took over a million Madagascan spiders four years to spin the thread which was then woven at a cost of more than half a million dollars into a lush golden-hued textile about 4 feet by 11 feet long. This unique, rare gossamer silk cloth with geometric, bird, and floral motifs is currently on exhibit at the **Grand Gallery** in the **American Museum of Natural History** in **New York City**.

# **FIRST AID**

A young man sprinkling his lawn and bushes with pesticides wanted to check the contents of the barrel to see how much pesticide remained in it. He raised the cover and lit his lighter; the vapors inflamed and engulfed him. He jumped from his truck, screaming. His neighbor came out of her house with a dozen eggs, yelling: "bring me some eggs!" She broke them, separating the whites from the yolks. The neighbor woman helped her to apply the whites on the young man's face. When the ambulance arrived and when the EMTs saw the young man, they asked who had done this. Everyone pointed to the lady in charge. They congratulated her and said: "You have saved his face." By the end of the summer, the young man brought the lady a bouquet of roses to thank her. His face was like a baby's skin.

#### Healing Miracle for burns:

Keep in mind this treatment of burns which is included in teaching beginner fireman this method. First aid consists to spraying cold water on the affected area until the heat is reduced and stops burning the layers of skin. Then, spread egg whites on the affected area.

One woman burned a large part of her hand with boiling water. In spite of the pain, she ran cold faucet water on her hand, separated 2 egg white from the yolks, beat them slightly and dipped her hand in the solution. The whites then dried and formed a protective layer. She later learned that the egg white is a natural collagen and continued during at least one hour to apply layer upon layer of beaten egg white. By afternoon she no longer felt any pain and the next day there was hardly a trace of the burn. 10 days later, no trace was left at all and her skin had regained its normal color. The burned area was totally regenerated thanks to the collagen in the egg whites, a placenta full of vitamins. This information could be helpful to everyone!

#### WEDNESDAY NIGHT NETS

Additional Net Controls are needed for the Wednesday Night ARES, RACES & DLARC net. If we have enough interested operators, it will only be necessary for each operator to have only one net session in each three month period. Actually 13 weeks in a period, so 13 net controls would be ideal, and maybe some extras to fill in if needed. This would give us a pool of experienced controls, for any emergency which would arise. Interested operators should contact Don / KC3II at kc3ii@arrl.net. The NIMS IS-700 and ICS-100 courses are not required to be a net control, but should the need arise and we do supply controls and operators for real emergencies, then the courses requirement will be in effect and EMA issued IDs will be needed to be on the scene of an emergency.

# **RACES EMERGENCY REQUIREMENTS**

As of September 2006, NIMS IS-700 and ICS-100 course certifications are required in order to receive the county issued photo IDs. The photo IDs are required by federal law for participation in, on site RACES emergency operations. These courses can be taken on line by going to www.fema.gov and following the directions. These requirements are not needed to participate in the weekly Wednesday nets. The only requirement for these nets is a valid amateur radio license and an

interest in emergency communications.
