FROM THE PRESIDENT'S SHACK



Listen...... George / N3SQD

The CQ DX Marathon is on. Our scores for this year long contest are being handled (and the contest is being promoted) by Jay N3OW. Now, I have no expectation of a big score in this contest. But, I am using it for motivation to get on the air a bit more. With my schedule, I need all the motivation I can get. Thank you Jay. If you aren't familiar with this contest, talk to Jay and join in the fun.

As a result, this past Sunday I was tuning around looking for some DX. I found CU2CE in the Azores on 20M. He had a solid S9 signal and a respectable pile-up, so I listened. While waiting for an opportunity to call I heard all manner of stations calling during the ongoing QSO. Finally, at the QRZ I threw out my call. No joy! He responded looking for a call ending in Z. With that came a call ending in N (nary a Z in it...). Once again he requested the call ending in Z. Once again came the call from the station ending in N. This time he made the call ending in Z and started that QSO. At the QRZ at the end of this QSO I again threw my call (as did the station with the call ending in N) as well as a dozen others. He came back to me and we had a short QSO. After my QSO, the station with the call ending in N (from Utah), finally got through. Now there are a number of things that you can infer about that ham (in Utah) from that observation, but I can't find any that are flattering. This got me to thinking that, as hams, we identify ourselves on each of our radio contacts. This is something to keep in mind as we operate. Someone once said (Lincoln, Twain,?) "that it is better to keep ones mouth shut and be thought a fool, than to open it and remove all doubt".

Another time when listening is important (isn't it always) is when working someone operating split. Rare (and not so rare) DX stations often operate split, that is they will transmit on one frequency and listen on some other frequency (actually a range of frequencies). They indicate this a number of ways, such as following their call with and up 5 (KHz) or down 2, or listening up 5 or listening down 2, or with the last 3 digits of the frequency where they are listening. If you hear some rare DX and no one seems to be on their frequency, chances are they are running split. Calling out on their frequency just tends to jam up their operation (and signals your inexperience or lack of attention). Have I done this? Yes, once, as a new ham and before I knew about split. It was pointed out to me very politely. Fortunately, as my friend Van K3CP used to remind me, "ignorance can be cured".

On the VHF repeater front, a couple of points on listening (and curing some bad habits we pick-up operating HF or VHF simplex). When making a call, key the mike and wait a second before speaking. Repeaters need some time to bring up the transmitter (as fast as electronics are, they're not instantaneous). This is especially true when voters and tone decoding is involved as is the case on the .70 machine. If I don't don't do this you'll here something like QD listening. Huh??? Another helpful hint is to wait for the courtesy beep (and maybe a second or two afterward). Some other station may be trying to join the QSO, or report an emergency.

With all the talk in the media about increasing civility in public discourse and my experience this weekend, the above seems appropriate. For those of you that knew this stuff and would never do any of these things, my apologies. I'm not preaching here... just making a few observations.

I hope to see you all at the February club meeting.

NEWS FROM THE MILK HOUSE

The Milk House continues to host 100 plus visitors last month.

December Visitors = 121

Throughout 2010 many members were involved in upgrading the capabilities of the Milk House. Many of these improvements were documented throughout year and have culminated in creating a multi-operator, multi-mode station. With the exception of EME

and satellite operations, the Milk House is capable of operating virtually any mode, on any band available to the amateur radio operator.

The current antenna configuration at the Milk House include:

Fan Dipole for 160, 80, 40, 20, 15, 10 meters, configured as an inverted V with the peak at 80 ft.

Off Center Fed wire for 80, 40, 20, 17, 12, 10, 6 meters at 50ft.

Dipole for 40 and 15 meter at 40 ft.

Cushcraft R7 Vertical for 40, 30, 20, 17, 12, 10 meters 20 and 40 meter delta loops that can be put up temporarily.

All antennas pass through Poly Phasers and Current Isolator/Baluns as they enter the Milk House. Antennas can be switched to any radio via a patch panel.

CQ DX MARATHON

The 2011 edition of the CQ DX Marathon begins at 0000 UTC on January 1, 2011 and runs through 2359 UTC on December 31, 2011. The goal, as always, is to work as many countries and CQ zones as possible at least once during the calendar year. There are no changes to the rules this year. Once again we will use a down loadable Microsoft Excel® template (or equivalent) which may be filled in and emailed to a special address as your log entry. Conversion programs are available to automatically populate the template from your logging program. See the DX Marathon website for details. Here are the 2011 rules for the CQ DX Marathon:

Rules, 2011 CQ DX Marathon Activity period:

The CQ DX Marathon is a year-long activity, beginning at 000 UTC January 1 and ending at 2359 UTC December 31. Each year's event is separate.

Frequencies: Any authorized amateur frequency may be used. Contacts through repeaters or satellites are not allowed for credit, nor are contacts with maritime or aeronautical mobile stations. All contacts must be made entirely over amateur radio frequencies—i.e., Echolink-type contacts do not count.

Modes: Any authorized amateur mode may be used. Three modes will be recognized in the DX Marathon: CW, SSB, and Digital. All modes other than CW and SSB will count as Digital. Submissions with all contacts utilizing a single mode will be recognized.

Categories: All awards are for single operator only. Entries with two or more callsigns will only count as a single entry if all contacts were made by the same (single) operator at the same station using the same antennas. There are two entry classes, "Formula" and "Unlimited." Formula: An entrant may choose one of two options in this class: (1) All contacts must be made with a maximum output power of 10 watts, regardless of band or mode; or (2) the operator may run a maximum of 100 watts output to a simple antenna, such as a vertical or dipole (see the appendix later on in these rules for further rules on antennas used in either option for Formula class). An operator in Formula class must select QRP (10 watts or less) or 100 watts and limited antennas at the beginning of the year's DX Marathon, and may not switch between entry modes during the year. All contacts must be made without assistance of any sort, including, but not limited to, lists, passes, or use of higher power or prohibited antennas to initially secure the contact. Use of spotting nets such as a DX Cluster® is allowed. Unlimited: Any antenna may be used, along with any power level for which the operator is licensed. Use of spotting nets such as DX Cluster® is allowed.

Scoring: Each country worked is worth one point. Each CQ zone worked is worth one point. The total score is the sum of zones and countries worked, on any mode and any authorized band. There are no multipliers of any kind. Each country and zone count only once. A single QSO may count for both a country and a zone. If in the course of the year you work 238 countries and 37 zones, your score is 275. If you work all 40 zones and 150 countries, your score is 190. The CQ DX Countries List and the CQ Zone List constitute the official lists. The lists are available on the DX Marathon web site. In the case of ties, the operator whose last scoring contact was earlier chronologically will be judged the winner. Decisions of the Marathon Manager are final.

Submissions: Submissions must be made electronically, via e-mail to <scores@dxmarathon.com>. A Microsoft Excel® template into which contacts may be entered is available for download from the CQ DX Marathon website at http://www.dxmarathon.com. The website also provides other options for those without access to Excel®. All scores must be received by January 31 following the close of each DX Marathon.

Verification: QSLs are not required. The operator is expected to claim contacts only from stations the operator has every reason to believe are legitimate, and only to claim contacts in which an accurate two-way exchange was clearly accomplished (see Appendix for further explanation). Scores will be adjusted by the DX Marathon committee for claimed contacts with pirates or any station not considered legitimate. Submissions may be penalized or voided in cases of fraud or poor sportsmanship. Submissions that do not provide clear descriptions of Formula class antennas to show that the antennas meet the Formula class antenna rules may be re-classified to Unlimited class. Decisions of the Marathon Manager are final. **Clubs:** Clubs are strongly encouraged to use the framework of this contest for intramural and regional competitions.

Claimed Scores: Competitors are encouraged to submit claimed scores to the DX Marathon website throughout the year. The claims will be updated regularly and posted on the website.

Results: The final listing of official scores will be posted on the DX Marathon website after the annual summary of entire winning scores and details is published in *CQ* magazine.

Awards:

Certificates: Certificates will be issued to the winners from*CQ DX Marathon Administrator each CQ zone and each CQ country. Where there is sufficient activity, additional certificates may be issued for other high scorers or for scores using a single mode.

Plaques: The CQ DX Marathon Committee will award plaques to the top scorer in each class. Additional sponsors are welcome. In all cases, the rulings of the CQ DX Marathon Committee and the CQ DX Marathon Manager are final.

This year's DX Marathon ends December 31, so it's time to go back through your log, see what you have worked, enter it onto the DX Marathon spreadsheet and then update it with any additional contacts through the end of the year. Don't forget the new countries created from the former Netherlands Antilles recently announced by *CQ* magazine! (*Note: These islands can count for a "double-dip" if you contacted them both before and after October 10, when their status changed.*) See rule 5 in the main text or the DX Marathon website for details on how and where to submit your log. Appendix

Formula Class antennas, option 1: Operators selecting the 10-watt option are limited to antennas on a single tower and whose height does not exceed 65 feet or 20 meters above ground elevation, within 330 feet or 100 meters of the tower base. Wire antennas may also be used but must meet the criteria of the 100-watt option, and may be tower-supported at only one point.

Formula Class antennas, option 2: Antennas for operators choosing the 100-watt option must be either simple verticals or wire antennas lacking significant gain. No arrays are allowed, whether vertical or horizontal, nor are long wires exceeding 130 feet or 40 meters, except on 80 and 160 meters. The base of vertical antennas used must not be more than 33 feet or 10 meters higher than the station floor and may not exceed 65 feet or 20 meters in total height. Dipoles or other wire antennas must not be more than 60 feet above ground. Yagis, quads, or tower mounted antennas (except wire antennas meeting the height limits above) may not be used in this category. Contacts: Each contact for a claimed country or zone must be a solid contact. The station claiming a contact with another station is expected to have had his or her callsign fully and accurately received and transmitted by the other station, and to have copied his/her own call being correctly sent by the other station. For example, K2MGA may not claim credit for a QSO with a DX station who had his call as K3MGA, even though in many cases the DX station would QSL the contact with the correction made (after receiving a card from K2MGA, realizing the error and correcting his/her log). For a contact to count, both stations must correctly copy all of both callsigns.

IS HAM RADIO DYING?

If you've been around ham radio for even a year or two, you've no doubt heard or participated in the debate as to whether or not ham radio is dying. The question is as perennial as the grass.

Recently, this was a topic of discussion on the ARRL PR mailing list. Allen, W1AGP, the ARRL's Media & PR Manager, generated a chart to show that ham radio is NOT dying. It showed the number of licensees in the U.S. every year from 2005 to 2009:

2005: 661,000 2006: 655,000 2007: 655,000 2008: 662,000 2009: 681,000 2010: 694,000!

This chart as drawn a good example of how you can lie with statistics. The y-axis started at 640,000, so the rate of increase in the number of licensees looked quite dramatic. Even so, the good news is that the number of licensees is quickly approaching 700,000, and should surpass that number shortly.

Upon seeing this chart, Jerry, N9TU, did a little statistical analysis of his own. Of the 83 licensees in his zip code, nine are deceased and one has expired. There are four Novices, 36 Techs, 18 Generals, 5 Advanced and ten Extras.

From this data, he deduces, "If this is an average sampling of deceased members, expired members and club licenses, there are roughly 90,000 fewer licensees than shown in the data nationwide. I have no clue of the error rate involved with my data. Your results may vary." My guess is that his zip code is probably pretty typical, and that his analysis is essentially correct.

There's also the question of activity. It's my guess that nearly half of all licensees are inactive, and that if we could figure out a way to activate those hams, then we'd really be able to say that our hobby is not dying. It's something worth thinking about, but there's certainly no easy answer to this problem. As Yogi Berra is purported to have said, "If people don't want to come out to the ball park, there's nothing you can do to stop them."

Overall, though, I think the numbers are headed in the right direction. Ham radio is NOT dying. Let's all keep up the good work.

JANUARY PROGRAM
