The number of visitors to the Milk House remained steady at about 100 for the month with the usual cast of characters.


The QRPers have thawed out and can be seen working DX from the picnic table outside the Milk House most Wednesday evenings.

2011 ATLANTIC HURRICANE SEASON FORECAST "Above Average"

Forecasters with the National Hurricane Center (NHC) are calling for an "above-average" Atlantic hurricane season for 2011. In its initial outlook for the 2011 Atlantic hurricane season -- which runs from June 1-November 30 -- the National Weather Service's Climate Prediction Center (CPC) is calling for a 65 percent probability of an above-normal season, a 25 percent probability of a near-normal season and a 10 percent probability of a below-normal season. -- ARRL

FEMA ADMIN PRAISES HAMS

At the Earthquake Communications Preparedness Forum, held on Tuesday, May 3, 2011 in Washington, DC, FEMA Administrator, Craig Fugate, had some kind words to say about ham radio. He noted that ham radio really is valuable "when all else fails."

The Web page describing the conference http://www.fcc.gov/event/earthquake-communications-preparedness-forum has a video of all the talks given at the conference. Fugate's remarks begin at the 18:45 mark. His remarks about amateur radio start at about 29:20.

I think it's great that the head of FEMA thinks so highly of hams. Before you get all excited about this, though, listen to all of Fugate's comments. He has some interesting comments about all of the different ways that responders gather information and provide information to the public in an emergency. I think listening to all of the remarks will help give those of

you who are involved with emergency communications more of an overall perspective, and may even help you evolve our role into something that's more useful in the future.

At one point, for example, Fugate held up a cell phone and told the audience to think of this device as both a data point and a sensor. Folks with cell phones can help emergency responders by sending video and audio of the situation, preparing the responders for what to expect when they do arrive. I don't know how many ARES/RACES groups have incorporated video into their emcomm plans, but it sounds like it should be.

Also important, says Fugate, is a solid knowledge of communities, local geography, and place names. I'm not sure if that's normally a part of emcomm training, but it sounds like it should be.

I'll be the first to admit that I'm not an emergency communications geek, so perhaps I'm talking through my hat. It seems to me, however, that it's important to listen to what guys like Fugate are saying and work with them to make amateur radio even more relevant and useful in emergency situations.

FEMA ADMINISTRATOR CALLS AMATEUR "THE LAST LINE OF DEFENSE"

In an FCC forum on earthquake communications preparedness, Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) Administrator Craig Fugate described the Amateur Radio operator as "the ultimate backup, the originators of what we call social media." The forum-- held May 3 at FCC Headquarters in Washington, DC -- brought together officials from the White House, the Department of Homeland Security (DHS), the United States Geological Survey (USGS), FEMA, the FCC and the private sector. Fugate and FCC Bureau of Public Safety and Homeland Security Chief Jamie Barnett gave the opening remarks

Later in the forum, Fugate spoke more on Amateur Radio. "During the initial communications out of Haiti, volunteers using assigned frequencies that they are allocated, their own equipment, their own money, nobody pays them, were the first ones oftentimes getting word out in the critical first hours and first days as the rest of the systems came back up," he told the forum. "I think that there is a tendency because we have done so much to build infrastructure and resiliency in all our other systems, we have tended to dismiss that role 'When Everything Else Fails.' Amateur Radio oftentimes is our last line of defense."

Fugate said that he thinks "we get so sophisticated and we have gotten so used to the reliability and resilience in our wireless and wired and our broadcast industry and all of our public safety communications, that we can never fathom that they'll fail. They do. They have. They will. I think a strong Amateur Radio community [needs to be] plugged into these plans. Yes, most of the time they're going be bored, because a lot of the time, there's not a lot they're going to be doing that other people aren't doing with Twitter and Facebook and

everything else. But when you need Amateur Radio, you really need them."

RUSSIA NOW PERMITING RECIPROCAL LICENSING THROUGH CEPT

On Wednesday, May 18, the European Communications Office (ECO) in Copenhagen added the Russian Federation to the list of those countries that accept the CEPT reciprocal operating arrangements. Now US hams who hold an FCC-issued General, Advanced or Amateur Extra class Amateur Radio licenses may operate in Russia, as well as the other countries covered by the European Conference of Postal and Telecommunications Administrations (CEPT), subject to the regulations in force in the country visited, to operate in those countries.

US amateurs holding an Advanced or Amateur Extra class license will be granted CEPT Radio Amateur License privileges in accordance with <u>CEPT Recommendation T/R 61-01 (as amended)</u>. US amateurs with a General class license will be granted CEPT Novice Radio Amateur License privileges, in accordance with <u>ECC Recommendation (05)06 (as amended)</u>.

While operating an amateur station in a CEPT country, the US amateur must have a copy of the <u>FCC Public Notice</u> <u>DA 11-221</u>, proof of US citizenship and evidence of their FCC license in their possession. They must show these documents to proper authorities upon request.

CEPT countries participating in ECC Recommendation (05)06 as of May 18, 2011 are: Belgium, Croatia, Czech

Republic, Denmark (including Greenland and the Faroe Islands), Germany, Hungary, Iceland, Liechtenstein, Luxembourg, Montenegro, Netherlands, Portugal, Romania, Russia, Slovak Republic, Slovenia and Switzerland.

CEPT countries participating in *CEPT Recommendation T/R 61-01* as of May 18, 2011 are: Austria, Belgium, Bosnia and Herzegovina, Bulgaria, Croatia, Cyprus, Czech Republic, Denmark (including Greenland and the Faroe Islands), Estonia, Finland, France (including Corsica, Guadeloupe, French Guyana, Martinique, St Bartholomew, St Pierre and Miquelon, St Martin, Reunion and its Dependencies, Mayotte, French Antarctica, French Polynesia and Clipperton, New Caledonia, and Wallis and Futuna), Germany, Greece, Hungary, Iceland, Ireland, Italy, Latvia, Liechtenstein, Lithuania,

Luxembourg, Macedonia, Moldova, Monaco, Montenegro, Netherlands, Norway, Poland, Portugal, Romania, Russia, Slovak Republic, Slovenia, Spain, Sweden, Switzerland, Turkey, Ukraine and the United Kingdom (including Northern Ireland, the Channel Islands and the Isle of Man).

JUNE PROGRAM



Al / W3CE presented his program on APRS. It is a two-way tactical real-time digital communications system between all assets in a network sharing information about everything going on in the local area. On ham radio, this means if something is happening now, or there is information that could be valuable to you, then it should show up on your APRS radio in your mobile. APRS also supports global callsign-to-callsign messaging, bulletins, objects email and Voice because every local area is seen by the Internet System (APRS-IS)! APRS should enable local and global amateur radio operator contact at anytime-anywhere and using any device.

The Automatic Packet Reporting System was designed to support rapid, reliable exchange of information for local, tactical real-time information, events or nets. The concept, which dates back to the mid 1980's, is that all relevant information is transmitted immediately to everyone in the net and every station captures that information for consistent and standard display to all participants. Information was

refreshed redundantly but at a decaying rate so that old information was updated less frequently than new info. Since the primary objective is consistent exchange of information between everyone, APRS established standard formats not only for the transmission of POSITION, STATUS, MESSAGES, and QUERIES, it also establishes guidelines for display so that users of different systems will still see the same consistent information displayed in a consistent manner (independent of the particular display or mapping system in use). The two images below should give you an idea of the kinds of information available to the mobile operator on his APRS radio. On the left is the Kenwood D710 radio showing the station list, and on the right is the attached GPS with map display showing the location of other APRS stations.

Al finished with a demonstration of the various devices that could be added to existing equipment to enable APRS tracking and then the

newest equipment with APRS capability that is ready for use.

- 7. Worketh thee not on energized equipment, for if thou dost, thy buddies wilt surely be buying beer without thee, and thy space at the bar will be filled by another.
- 8. Verily, Verily I say unto thee: never service high voltage equipment alone, for electric cooking is a slothful process, and thou mayst sizzle in thine own fat for hours on end before thy Maker see fit to end thy misery and drag thee into his fold.
- 9. Trifle thee not with radioactive devices and tubes lest thou commence to glow in the dark like unto a lightning bug.

WHAT YOU CAN DO WITH ALKA SELTZER

DID YOU KNOW?

HIDDEN POISONS IN YOUR CLOTHES

Dangerous chemicals are all around us – even in everyday items that we think of as safe. Here are some of the most common dangers – and what to do.

<u>WRINKLE-FREE FABRICS</u> – Perflour-chemicals (PFCs) are added to fabrics for durability, stain resistance and wrinkle resistance. Clothing labeled "No Iron", "permanent press" and wrinkle free often contain PFCs. PFCs are extremely long lasting in the body because they cannot be broken down and eliminated. They accumulate in the body's cells and have been linked to reproductive and developmental toxicity, as well as cancers of the liver and bladder.

The chemicals in clothing may be absorbed through the skin or inhaled when they let off the gas from the fabrics. In addition, synthetic fibers, including polyester and nylon, may contain substances as polyvinyl chloride, a known carcinogen, and phthalates, a group of chemicals that disrupts hormones.

What to use instead: Clothes made from 100% natural fibers, such as cotton, linen, wool and cashmere and not labeled "wrinkle-free", "Stain resistance", "static resistance" etc.

<u>DRY CLEANING</u> – A chemical cleaning solution, usually **perchloroethylene** (perc), is used to saturate clothing and remove dirt and stains. Unfortunately plenty of the solution remains in clothing fibers after the cleaning is done.

Exposure to perc has been linked to kidney and liver damage. It causes cancer in laboratory animals. Even short-term exposure can result in dizziness, headaches and a rapid heart rate. One study that looked at air samples found elevated levels of perc for up to 48 hours after dry cleaned fabrics were brought into the home.

California and other states have mandated the dry cleaners stop using perc by the year 2023, in the meantime you can .

AIR IT OUT. Remove the plastic from dry-cleaned fabrics and hang them out of doors or in a garage or other well-ventilated area for one or two days. If they still have a chemical smell, air them out another day or two.

USE A BARRIER LAYER. Wear a t-shirt or other tank top underneath a jacket or other clothing that has been dry-

FIND A "GREEN" DRY CLEANER. Look for one that uses liquid carbon dioxide. To find a green clean cleaner, go to www.greencleanerscouncil.com.
