MAY PROGRAM

“ Critical Tools for the Casual Operator”

The May meeting brought us again another fine program from Paul / N0KIA. Beginning with a block diagram of a basic ham shack well presented us with an economic way to build a shack for the present-day technician. Using Harbor Freight and hamfests the necessary components could be purchased. Paul began with an older model rig, possibly obtained at a local ham Fest, adding a power supply also obtained at a hamfest, he presented the beginnings of a ham shack. Adding a cantenna to be the dummy load, the development of the shack continued. Then adding a wire antenna, the shack was almost ready to go on the air. The next step was adding a SWR meter, allowing the operator to check for the match of the antenna to the rig. The next addition would be replacing the SWR meter with the antenna tuner, which would allow the rig and antenna to be matched, preventing any damage to the rig. The final item to the shack would be the clock. Paul, continued to include the development of a VHF station. Which followed basically the same development as a low band station. He concluded with a question and answer session from the audience.

MINUTES FROM THE MAY 3rd MEETING

A general meeting of the Delaware-Lehigh Amateur Radio Club Inc. was held at the Bethlehem Area Vocational Technical School at 3300 Chester Avenue, Bethlehem, PA, on May 3rd, 2012
Call to Order: The meeting convened at 1938 hrs. with Dave Blankenship / N3EYT, Vice-President, presiding. President Charlie Lazarchak / W3OPA was absent.

Pledge of Allegiance: Led by Dave / N3EYT

Members in Attendance: 47 and 4 guests, Ron B., Wayne R., Steve / KB3SKD, and wife, Sonja.

Moment of Silence: Dave / N3EYT asked for a moment of silence for Diane Myers, wife of Lyle Myers / KB3SXI, and Bruce B. Navarre, Sr. / KA3TIU who recently died.

Activities of Members: Dave / N3EYT asked the membership what they had been doing recently? Jimi / KB3WGE reported that he has recently enjoyed exchanging QSL cards with other ham radio operators. Ben / KB3CTX was happy to report that he spotted Pete / NL7XM's QSL card on an episode of "Last Man standing", a relatively new TV show starring Tim Allen. Bob / KE3AW added that Pete / NL7XM has been in correspondence with the show's producer (John Amodeo) and it resulted in the exchange of QSL cards. Pete / NL7XM then arrived to confirm what had been reported and to state how thrilled he had been when he spotted his card prominently displayed in Tim Allen's shack during a scene in the show.

Guests Recognized: Dave / N3EYT asked whether any guests were in attendance. Ron B., Wayne R., and Steve / KB3SKD with wife Sonja stood and were recognized.

Approval of the Minutes: Joe / AB3OS reported the April minutes were correct as reported in the recent newsletter and asked for a motion to approve the April minutes. George / N3SQD so moved; 2nd by Bill / K3ANS. **Motion carried.**

Treasurer's Report: Mike / KB3LOD gave the March Treasurer's Report which was approved on a motion by Carl / AA3IX and 2nd by Dave / KA5IWC. **Motion carried.**

Milk House: With Dave / NB3R absent, Ken / N3IYX reported that Chris / Nu3L had recently toured the Milk House with visitors from Japan. Though none were hams they all seemed to enjoy the visit. Ken also reported that activity at the Milk House has been good with many members using the equipment and students visiting from the technical classes. Ken / N3IYX closed by reminding the membership that the Club is open Tuesday and Wednesday nights. The Club House is open many Friday nights and Saturday afternoons as well.

Repeater: Ben / KB3CTX reported that he had recently installed some D-STAR repeater updates on the system. He asked members to report any problems to him that they suspect may have been caused by these software updates. Carl / AA3IX asked whether any problems existed with the repeater, since he had recently noticed that the repeater's range did not seem as great as previously. George / N3SQD responded that there may be a problem with the coordination in the operation of the Wind Gap and the Nazareth repeaters. When an operator thinks he is in communication with the Nazareth repeater, it may be the Wind Gap repeater that he is communicating with. Ed / AA3OU reported that he has experienced noise when using the repeater. George / N3SQD reported that Barry / N3NVA is aware that a problem may exist and is working on it.

Spring Sprint: Ray / W3TDF asked that logs for those competing in the Spring Sprint be turned in the next few days, but he was unhappy to report that he was only aware of 7 participants so far with Bill / W0RSJ in 1st place, George / N3SQD in 2nd place, and Ray, Brad / W3JXQ, and Ben / KB3CTX tied for third. The final standings will be announced next month.

High Altitude Balloon: Dave / N3EYT asked Al / W3CE to report on the status of the High Altitude Balloon Project. Al / W3CE reported that two balloons are on order with a planning committee scheduled to meet in the next week or two to decide when, where, and with what payload the launch will take place. The launch is expected to reach an altitude of close to 100,000 ft. with the equipment costing a few hundred dollars. Al / W3CE upon a question from Dave / N3EYT stated that the project had yet to receive any contributions which prompted Mike / KB3LOD to report that a contribution had just been received in the amount of \$100.00. (With the Club's promised match of \$100.00 that meant that \$200 would flow to the Project.) Pete / NL7XM upon recognition from Dave / N3EYT then made a motion to increase the Club's match to \$250.00. Pete / NL7XM observed that it is money that the Club could well afford at present and it would encourage members to contribute more to the Project. This motion was 2nd by George / N3SQD and, after some questions and discussion, passed on a vote of the floor. **Motion carried.**

Technical Classes: Bob / KE3AW reported that the technical classes were over with a VE Session planned for the next night. An addition VE Session was planned for Tuesday night, 5 days from the meeting.

MS Walk: Dave asked for a report for the MS Walk that he observed was scheduled for May 6th. Howard / W03P was not present to report, but Ken / N3IYX announced that Howard is without a car at present and needs a volunteer to drive him to the event. Anyone interested should contact Howard / W03P.

Field Day: George / N3SQD announced that Field Day will take place on June 23rd and 24th at Louise Moore Park. The Setup will commence at 9:00 A. M. on June 23rd with operations commencing at 2:00 P. M. on June 23rd and ending at 2:00 P. M. on June 24th. We have permission to enter and leave the Park during the 24 hour period the contest is going on.

Woman's 5K Walk/Run: Don / KC3II announced that Charley / N3WXO needs volunteers, for June 9th. The event starts at 9:00 AM, and 12-15 volunteers are needed. Refer to the Club newsletter for details.

Nominating Committee: Dave / N3EYT reminded the membership that October meeting elections are approaching and volunteers are needed for the Nominating Committee. Anyone interested in serving should contact Dave / N3EYT.

Membership: George / N3SQD announced two new candidates for membership. Donald J. Boehrer / KB3YGR and Carl "Joe" Post / KB3TOD. After a brief introduction of their backgrounds and areas of interest, George / N3SQD asked for a motion to accept them as members of D.L.A.R.C. Dave / KA3IWC so moved; 2nd by Ben / KB3CTX. **Motion carried.** George reported that membership now stood at 152.

Paul/N0KIA: On prompting by Dave / N3EYT, Paul /N0KIA gave a little tease for his program for the evening.

Hamfest - Wrightstown; Barry / KU3X suggested that the members may be interested in a hamfest in Wrightstown on Saturday, two days hence.

Black Bear Ride: Ben / KB3CTX expressed his concern that the Club may not be able to provide communications for the Black Bear this year since it is scheduled on October 13th and conflicts with the PA QSO Party. And many volunteers are needed to man the Black Bear due to the communication problems presented by the topography of the area. Al / W3CE added that this would be a perfect event for those new to ham radio with a technical license since it is a 2 meter operation well within the ability of a novice operator. Those interested in volunteering should contact Ben / KB3CTX.

Adjournment: With no other business, the meeting adjourned.

Raffle: Dick / KB3ALG won the raffle and donated his winnings to the Club.

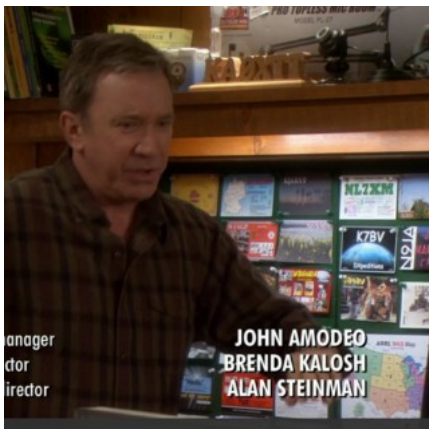
FIELD DAY 2012

WOMAN'S 5K WALK / RUN

I have been contacted again by Robert Cegin as the race director for Lehigh Valley Woman's 1st Strides. It's Woman's 5K Run as a satellite of the LV Road Runners which supports breast cancer. We are asked to be at the Hanover Township 5K Walk/Run to help with communications support for the event and point the runners the directions to run. For those of you who have helped before know it's an easy event and a great community to be at. Which makes it perfect for 1st time helpers. The event is on Saturday morning, June 9th. I was requested to have 12 to 15 operators to support the event for communications. I will be at the Hanover Township Community Center around 0800, or earlier, to get things started, and will need operators with 2 meter HTs (and batteries) or mobiles. I will hold a pre-deployment meeting/briefing at the Community Center parking lot between 08:30 and 08:40 and for those coming to help, talk-in will be on the W3OK 146.700 repeater system. It is a rain or shine event and is located at 3660 Jacksonville Road, Bethlehem, Pa.. Stations should be deployed to course locations (certain intersections and turns) between 08:45 and 0850.

At this point, I also want to mention that there is a possibility that I may not be able to attend due to a new job. I will still be fully coordinating this event as well as being the liaison with Robert Cegin at the Community Center. I know that someone will step up to be net control for the event if I can't attend. I'll keep everyone posted and will take any offers from anyone to be my back-up NCS.

The start of the race is 09:00 with walkers at about 09:02, and expect to go to about 09:45 with the last walker crossing the finish line. This is a more serious run so we won't have many walkers but they are expecting well over 400 runners. Frequencies will be finalized the morning of the race, but expect to be using 147.535 simplex and the W3OK repeater as a backup. I will give further updates as I know more. Be sure to bring anything you may need (water, soda, snack foods, etc.) while deployed. If you are able to lend your services, please contact me directly with any of the information below. I need to know in advance who I have available. If you are able help, please contact me regarding your intentions at your earliest convenience so I enough time to finalize plans and perform any other coordination activities. Thank you in advance for your response and support to the event and community.

Also, if you have an ARES vest, be sure to wear it. If not, other orange or yellow vest will also help to highlight you on the course.

REPEATER ETIQUETTE

Atlantic County ARES Web Page Via **Bob Green / KE3AW**

Every couple of years it seemed we used to "remind" operators using our repeaters of the proper etiquette to be used on W3OK. With numerous new hams over the past couple years, or hams new to this area, it may be worth considering using/altering to suit us some such guide to operators in our club. I know, from recent questions to me about a number of points covered in this article, below...

Here is the Delaware-Lehigh Amateur radio Club Repeater Etiquette.

Use of the W3OK Repeater

- 1-Usage will be in accordance with FCC Rules Part 97.
- 2-Users will comply with directives of the control operator.
- 3-Transmissions will be courteous and professional. (See Basic Repeater Etiquette Below)
- 4-The time out timer is set for 90 Seconds. Keep transmissions under that time. Leave breaks between transmissions so the repeater can drop and the time out timer resets.

Basic Repeater Etiquette

- 1-Starting a QSO via a directed call. There are two main ways by which a QSO can begin, one is via a directed call and one is via monitoring. A directed call is where one amateur calls another amateur individually, such as "N3XYZ from K3ABC". In such a case, K3ABC is looking for one particular individual, N3XYZ. It generally is not an invitation for anyone other than N3XYZ to return the call. If N3XYZ doesn't answer the call, K3ABC may just clear off by saying "K3ABC clear", or may clear and listen for other calls by saying "K3ABC clear and listening". The "and listening" or "and monitoring" implies they are interested in hanging around to QSO with anyone else who might be listening at that time. "Listening" and "monitoring" don't mean you are listening to somebody else's conversation, they mean you are listening for other people who may want to call you to start a new QSO. Likewise, just saying your call by itself with nothing following it is meaningless. If you were to say "N3XYZ", people listening wouldn't know if that means you were monitoring for calls, whether you were testing, or whether they missed the callsign of a party you were calling. Be concise, but be complete.
- 2-Starting a QSO via a monitoring call. If the repeater is not in use, simply stating your callsign followed by "listening" or "monitoring" implies that you are listening to the repeater and are interested in having a QSO with anyone else. Calling CQ on a repeater is generally not common, a simple "N3XYZ listening" will suffice. There is no need to repeat the "listening" message over and over again as you might do when calling CQ on HF. Once every few minutes should be more than sufficient, and if someone hasn't answered after a few tries, it probably means there is nobody around. If someone is listening and wants to QSO, they will answer back. Avoid things like "is anybody out there" or "is there anybody around on frequency"; it sounds like a bad sci-fi movie.
- 3-Joining a QSO in progress. If there is a conversation taking place which you would like to join, simply state your callsign when one user unkeys. This is the reason for having a courtesy tone: to allow other users to break into the conversation. One of the stations in QSO, usually the station that was about to begin his transmission, will invite you to join, either before making his own transmission or afterward. Don't interrupt a QSO unless you have something to add to the topic at hand. Interrupting a conversation is no more polite on a repeater than it is in person.
- 4-Interrupting a QSO to make a call. If you need to make a directed call to another amateur but there is already another QSO going on, break into the conversation during the courtesy tone interval by saying "Call please, N3XYZ". One of the stations will allow you to make your call. If the station you are calling returns your call, you should quickly pass traffic to them and relinquish the frequency to the stations who were already in QSO; don't get into a full QSO in the middle of someone else's conversation. If you need to speak with the party you call for a significant length of time (say, more than 15 seconds), ask them to either wait until the current QSO has cleared, or ask them to move to another repeater or simplex channel to continue the conversation.
- 5-Roundtables and "Turning it Over". When more than two amateurs are in a QSO, it is often referred to as a "roundtable" discussion. Such a QSO's usually go in order from amateur A to amateur B to amateur C ... and eventually back to amateur A again to complete the roundtable. To keep everyone on the same page, when any one amateur is done making a transmission, they "turn it over" to the next station in sequence (or out of sequence, if so desired). Without turning it over to a particular station when there are multiple stations in the QSO, nobody knows who is supposed to go next, and there ends up either being dead silence or several stations talking at once. At the end of a transmission, turn it over to the next station by naming them or giving their callsign, such as "...and that's that. Go ahead Joe." or "...and that's that. Go ahead XYZ." If it's been close to 10 minutes, it's a good time to identify at the same time as well, such as "...and that's that. N3XYZ, go ahead Joe."
- 6-IDing and Who's Who? By FCC regulations, you must always identify at 10 minute intervals and at the end of a transmission. If you are making a test transmission or calling another party, this is a one-way transmission. Since it has no "length" as there is no QSO taking place, you should identify each time you make a call or a test transmission. When identifying yourself and another party (or parties), or when making a directed call, your callsign goes **LAST**. "N3XYZ, K3ABC" means that K3ABC is calling N3XYZ, not the other way around. There is no need to identify each time you make a transmission, only once every 10 minutes. You do not need to identify the station with whom you are speaking, only your own callsign, but it is generally polite to remember the call of the other station. Avoid phonetics on FM unless there is a reason for using them, such as the other station misunderstanding your callsign. When phonetics are needed, stick to the standard phonetic alphabet.
- 7-Demonstrations. From time to time, an amateur may want to demonstrate the capabilities of amateur radio to another non-amateur. The typical way to do this is to ask for a "demo" such as "N3XYZ for a demonstration." Anyone who is listening to

the repeater can answer them back. Usually telling the calling party your name, callsign, and location is what they are looking for, not a lengthy conversation. Someone doing a demo may ask for stations in a particular area to show the range of amateur radio communications, such as if the calling station is in the Poconos they may ask for any stations in south Jersey or Harrisburg areas, which is more interesting than demonstrating that they can talk to someone in the same town as they are in.

- 8-Signal Reports. If you are unsure how well you are making it into the repeater, **DO NOT** kerchunk the repeater. Any time you key up the repeater, you should identify, even if you are just testing to see if you are making the machine. "N3XYZ test" is sufficient. Do not use the repeater as a "target" for tuning or aiming antennas, checking your transmitter power, etc. Use a dummy load where appropriate, or test on a simplex frequency. If you need someone to verify that you are making the repeater OK, ask for a signal report such as "N3XYZ, can someone give me a signal report?" "Radio check" is a term most often used on CB, "signal report" is what most amateurs ask for.
- 9-Language. Aside from some of the techno-syncretisms inherent in amateur vernacular, use plain conversational English. The kind of English that would be suitable for prime-time television, not R rated movies. Avoid starting or encouraging conflicts on the air. If a topic of conversation starts to draw strong debate, change the subject. Avoid "radio-ese" lingo whenever possible. CB has its own language style and so does amateur radio, but the two are not the same. Amateurs have "names", not "personals". Although many new hams have graduated from the CB ranks, let's try to keep CB lingo off the amateur bands. When visiting a new repeater, take some time to monitor before jumping in to get a feel for the type of traffic and operating mannerisms of that particular system. Some repeaters are very free-wheeling in that there are people jumping in and out of conversations constantly. Others primarily have directed calls on them and discourage ragchewing. Others are member-exclusive repeaters. Listen before you talk, when in Rome do as the Romans do.
- 10-Emergencies. If there is a QSO going on, break into a conversation with the word "Break" or "Break for priority traffic." **DO NOT USE THE WORD BREAK TO JOIN IN A QSO UNLESS THERE IS AN EMERGENCY!** All stations should give immediate priority any station with emergency traffic.
- 11-Malicious Interference. If there is malicious interference, such as kerchunking, touch-tones, rude comments, etc. **DO NOT ACKNOWLEDGE IT!** Continue the QSO in a normal fashion. If the interference gets to the level where it is impossible to carry on the QSO, simply end the QSO as you normally would.
- 12-Power. Use the minimum power necessary to complete a QSO. However, the minimum power necessary doesn't just mean you are barely tickling the repeater receiver squelch. If someone says that you are noisy, increase power or relocate or take whatever measures you can to improve your signal. Continuing to make transmissions after being told your signal is noisy is inconsiderate to those listening. The amateur radio manufacturers continue to come up with newer, smaller handheld radios, many with power levels well under a watt. Many new amateurs start out with a handheld radio as their "first rig". Although convenient, they aren't the most effective radios in terms of performance. Without a good external antenna, operating a handheld radio indoors or inside a car is going to result in a lot of bad signal reports.

HOW TO REGISTER ON THE DLARC WEB PAGE

Only club members can register to the site.

Only club members can post to the site or gain access to the club rosters which includes addresses, phone#s, e-mail etc. I believe there will be more added later that members only have access. Scroll down on the front page. You will see on the left a place to log in. Under the log in spaces you will see:

Click on "create an account"

Now you will see the registration form. All fields must be filled in.

We are a private forum/web page on the site so feel free to use your real name in the first space.

Next a working e-mail address for your confirmation e-mail

Next pick a password

Next space re-type your password

Click the register button to the lower left.

You will then be brought back to the DLARC home page - at the top of the page will be this message:

"Your account has been created and an activation link has been sent to the e-mail address you entered. Note that you must activate the account by clicking on the activation link when you get the e-mail before you can log in."

Wait for the e-mail and follow the directions from there. The web master will check your call sign against the up to date / dues paid roster for 2009. If you are not on it you will be rejected. If you do not use your call sign you will be rejected.

HOW TO REMOVE SKUNK SMELL FROM DOGS

Has your dog been sprayed by a skunk? Even if not, all dog owners should know how to handle it - just in case. You may have heard of skunk odor remedies like tomato juice or vinegar, but they really just cover up the odor. Products like [Nature's Miracle Skunk Odor Remover](#) have been known to work, but may be hard to find in a pinch. You can remove the odor from your dog using household items. It's all thanks to chemist [Paul Krebaum](#), who developed the [recipe](#) in 1993. Skunk spray is very oily and contains sulfur (hence the stench). This recipe causes a chemical reaction that breaks up the oils and neutralizes the odor.

Time Required: 30-60 minutes

Here's How: As soon as you realize your dog has been sprayed by a skunk, don some rubber or latex gloves and old clothes and look her over for bites or scratches. Also check her eyes for redness or discharge. If any injuries are found, you should contact your veterinarian before proceeding.

1. Time is of the essence here - the longer you wait to begin the process, the harder it will be to remove the stench. Get set up for [bathing your dog](#) outdoors or in an easy to clean area of your home (laundry room, bathroom, etc). If indoors, open a window to save your nose!
2. Apply a small strip of eye lubricant (such as [Puralube](#)) or 1-2 drops of mineral oil to your dog's eyes. This will help protect the eyes in case any of the solution splashes or drips in.
3. In the plastic container, combine 1 quart hydrogen peroxide, 1/4 cup baking soda and 1 to 2 teaspoons of liquid soap. Add lukewarm water if needed (for larger dogs). Mix ingredients well. The solution will fizz, as a chemical reaction is occurring. Use immediately - do not store.
4. Do not soak your dog with water prior to bathing. Promptly begin cleansing the affected areas thoroughly, massaging the solution deep into your dog's coat. You may wish to use a sponge or washcloth. Avoid getting the solution in the eyes, ears or mouth.
5. Allow the solution to remain on your dog for at least five minutes (longer if strong odor persists).
6. Rinse your dog well with lukewarm water. Repeat steps 3-5 as necessary until odor is gone.
7. Dry your dog well and give her a treat!

Tips:

NEVER place the solution in a closed container or spray bottle, as the pressure will build up and the container could burst. This could cause serious injury to you and your dog.

DO NOT use higher concentrations of hydrogen peroxide or substitute baking soda with "similar" products. The altered chemical reaction could cause severe injury to you and your dog.

Be certain you use fresh hydrogen peroxide, as it becomes less concentrated over time. If you are unsure how old your hydrogen peroxide is (or if it is expired) get fresh bottles just in case.

1. The solution can be used to remove skunk odor from clothing and other fabrics. However, it can have a mild bleaching effect on some materials. In addition, your dog's coat may become slightly lighter as a result of the solution. If this happens, it should resolve over time. Don't worry, your black dog will not become a platinum blond!
2. To help avoid future meetings between skunks and your dog, try to prevent skunks from becoming attracted to your property. Do not leave food outside, including bird seed and fallen fruit from trees. Make sure garbage cans are well-secured. Placing moth balls and ammonia-soaked rags around your property might deter skunks from approaching. In addition, keep your dog within eye shot and keep her from running into wooded areas unattended.
