MINUTES FROM THE FEBRUARY 2nd MEETING



A general meeting of the Delaware-Lehigh Amateur Radio Club Inc. was held at the Bethlehem Area Vocational Technical School at 3300 Chester Avenue, Bethlehem, PA,

Call to Order: The meeting convened at 1932 hrs. with President Charlie Lazarchak / W3OPA presiding.

Pledge of Allegiance: Led by Charlie / W3OPA

Members in Attendance: 50 and 1 guest.

Activities of Members: Charlie / W3OPA opened the meeting by asking the membership what they had been doing recently? Charlie / W3OPA mentioned that Barry / KU3X has an idea for a "show and tell" segment for the Club meetings that may find a place in future meetings. Charlie / W3OPA then shared that he had recently picked up a J38 straight-key for \$5 at a flea market. It is a military training key that was recently listed on eBay for about \$40. George / N3SQD then shared that he has been checking out the 10m band and found that it has been very active. Those with a technician license should take advantage of this opportunity to do some DXing on the 10m band. Jay / N3OW reported that he had recently worked two DXpedition stations. Jay also was happy to report that he had recently learned that his station was the winner for Berks county in the 2011 PA QSO Party. Jeff / N3QO reported that his station was the winner in Montgomery county for the PA QSO. Jon / NJ3I reported working a distant station in CW at .0 5 W! Pete / NL7XM, in answer to a question from the floor, briefly talked about Winter Field Day, which had recently taken place January 28th to January 29, 2012. In response to the popularity of Field Day of mid-summer, Winter Field Day came into being a few years ago and has been gaining a little more traction each year that it has been in existence. Pete and fellow competitors won the event in its inaugural year. The object of the event is familiar to most Amateur Radio operators: set up an emergency-style communications and make as many contacts as possible during the 24 hour period.

REPORTS:

Approval of the Minutes: Joe / AB3OS reported a problem with the minutes in January. THE 2012 DLARC (2-METER) SPRINT

This years event will be held on Saturday, April 14, from 10:00AM until 11:00AM EDST. All activity will be 2-Meter FM SIMPLEX in the 146MHz portion of the band. Each individual simplex frequency will have a letter assigned as if it were a different band as hereby shown, 146.43=A, 146.46=B, 146.49=C, 146.52=D, 146.55=E and 146.58=F.

It is important that the letter designation must be entered in your log for each contact. You are encouraged to make QSO's with each station on as many different frequencies as you can, (see scoring). Times should be entered for each contact.

The EXCHANGE will be a personally chosen 3 letter group. Suggested is the 3 letter abbreviations for the PA Counties as used in the PA QSO Parties. Or, you can use your personal initials. Choose one of the county abbrevs as shown here,

ARM, ADA, BUX, BRA, CMB, CAR, DAU, DCO, ERI, FAY, FRA, GRE, HUN, INN, JUN, LAW, LUZ, MGY, MER, NUM, NHA, PHI, POT, SCH, SUS, TIO, UNI, VEN, WAR, WAY, YOR. SCORING will be ONE point for each contact, (all freqs totaled). A multiplier will be determined as follows; ONE mult will be awarded for each station that is contacted on a minimum of 4 different Freqs.

These requirements will make it truly a sprint atmosphere. Chit-chatting will be less productive, so be forewarned. If you want to make a real splash then be sure to have all the Freqs programmed into your radios.

LOG REQUIREMENTS are; Each page must show in the header your CALL and your chosen 3-LETTER exchange sent. The individual log entry must include; TIME, FREQ LETTER, CALL and PERSONAL 3-LETTER INFO RECEIVED.

Final score may be your arithmetic, but will be checked by the committee.

Logs may be mailed to Pete,NL7XM, or to me, or may be turned in at the May meeting. The winner awards will be made at the June meeting. A list of the scores will be available. [If you work 25 people on all 6 Freqs, (that's 150 QSO's) which would give you a multiplier of 25, your score (max.) would be 3750 points. Surely possible, but? 150 Q's in one hour?]

DAYLIGHT SAVINGS TIME

Daylight saving time (DST)—also **summer time** in several countries including in British English and European official terminology is the practice of temporarily advancing clocks during the summertime so that evenings have more daylight and mornings have less. Typically clocks are adjusted forward one hour near the start of spring and are adjusted backward in autumn. Modern DST was first proposed in 1895 by George Vernon Hudson and it was first implemented during the First World War. Many countries have used it at various times since then; Details vary by locations.

DST clock shifts present other challenges. They complicate timekeeping, and can disrupt meetings, travel, billing, recordkeeping, medical devices, heavy equipment, and sleep patterns. Software can often adjust computer clocks automatically, but this can be limited and error-prone, particularly when DST protocols are changed.

So now having read this brief history, do not forget to turn your clocks ahead one hour on March 11.

I will be at the Hanover Township Community Center around 0800 to get things started, and will need operators with 2 meter HTs (and batteries) or mobiles. I will hold a pre-deployment meeting/briefing at the Community Center parking lot between 08:30 and 08:40 and for those coming to help, talk-in will be on the W3OK 146,700 repeater system. 2011 PA QSO PARTY

The winner of the D.L.A.R.C.'s annual Norm Zoltak / K3NZ award for 2011, with a total score 119,302 points, was Joe O'Brien / WI2E. Joe had 527 QSOs, All 527 QSOs were CW contacts, with 58 counties and 54 sections. Second place was Ben / KB3CTX, with a score of 112,341 points Ben had 676 QSOs 46 CW, 453 phone with 67 counties and 51 sections. Third place was Chris / NU3L, with a score of 92,119 points. Chris had 665 QSOs, 46 CW, 619 phone with 66 counties and 62 sections. Perennial winner, Ray / W3TDF had a score of 166,445 points. Ray had 928 QSOs. 229 CW, 629 phone and 67 counties and 67 sections. Ray asked not to be considered for the award, because of having won it so often.

2011 PA QSO PARTY

Club competition scores are out and the D.L.A.R.C. came in second with 1,161,209 points. The winner was the Frankfort radio Club with 1,339,888 points.

Over all, N3OW was third highest for Berks County, NU3L was second highest and KE3AW was third highest in Lehigh County. W3TDF was highest in Mifflin County and N3QO was highest in Montgomery County. WI2E was second highest in Northampton County and N3EBH was second highest in Union County.

AMATEUR RADIO FINALLY JUMPS ON THE MAKER BANDWAGON

Over three years ago, I wrote that amateur radio should do more to associate itself with the Maker, or "do it yourself" (DIY) movement (www.kb6nu.com/lets-get-on-the-maker-bandwagon/). Well, it finally looks like it is going to do just that. Just before the first of the year, the ARRL unveiled its DIY campaign (www.arrl.org/news/arrl-launches-new-diy-campaign). The most visible part of the campaign is a video (www.youtube.com/ARRLHQ), but there are also some other bits, including:

- a flier to be handed out to interested persons,
- buttons that say "Ask Why I DIY with Ham Radio," and
- a PowerPoint presentation and speaker's notes that you can use to give a presentation to an amateur radio club or other non-ham group.

These items are available from the ARRL website, www.arrl.org/DIY.

CQ also on board

CQ magazine is also jumping on the bandwagon. They recently announced that they will run a quarterly "Maker" column, written by Matt Stultz, KB3TAN. Stultz is the founder of HackPittsburgh, a "hackerspace" or community workshop for makers in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania. He has been a ham since 2009 and has integrated amateur radio into many of HackPittsburgh's activities. Stultz's first column, titled "We Are Makers," will appear in the March issue of CQ. It provides a general introduction to the maker/hacker community for hams, as well as a description of a high-altitude balloon project that brought the two groups together in Pittsburgh.

Hams at the Maker Faire

In 2006, Make: magazine hosted the first Maker Faire (www.makerfaire.com) in San Mateo, CA. Since then, Maker Faires have also been held in Austin, TX, New York, NY; and Detroit, MI. Maker Faires are showcases for all kinds of crazy projects that people are working on.

Hams usually have a presence at these events. This year, the theme for one of the amateur radio groups participating in the California Maker Faire, which is the flagship event, is Arduino (www.arduino.cc) applications in amateur radio. Michael, NE6RD, who is organizing this group has lined up several very cool projects. One of them is an Arduino-controlled satellite antenna system. A project I proposed is an Arduino-controlled keyer. On the face of it, this is not a real exciting project, but my twist on this is that instead of directly keying a transmitter, I plan to have the Arduino actuate a solenoid that will press a straight key. That should make the project a little more visual.

Hams sometimes like to claim that we were the original makers and hackers. We certainly have a long tradition of DIYing. Let's show these upstarts exactly what ham radio is capable of. Perhaps, in the process, we'll even entice a few of them to join us.

ARMY MARS AND WINLINK UPDATE

According to Pudge Forrester, AAA9GL, government liaison for <u>Army MARS</u>, Lieutenant General Susan Lawrence has reversed the decision to phase out the use of the <u>WinLink 2000</u> global radio e-mail system by Army MARS members. Ms Lawrence stated that the Army, after reviewing its capabilities, had decided that the continued use of WinLink 2000 was a valuable asset to Army MARS members and agencies that were using the service. She issued a statement to that effect on December 21, 2011. On January 5, 2012, the Chief of Army MARS officially notified his membership that the phase out notice had been rescinded.

Army MARS members and agencies who had been using the service hailed the decision by Ms Lawrence and resumed use of WinLink 2000.

FCC SETS DATE FOR MEDICAL DEVICES ON 70cm

In November 2011, FCC Commissioners unanimously agreed to allocate spectrum and adopt service and technical rules for the utilization of new implanted medical devices that operate on 413-457 MHz (70 cm). These devices will be used on a secondary basis as part of the Medical Device Radiocommunication (MedRadio) Service in Part 95 of the FCC rules. In the Federal Register for Friday, January 27, the FCC announced that the effective date for these new rules is Monday, February 27. The new rules expand the existing MedRadio Service rules to permit the use of new wideband medical implant devices that employ neuromuscular microstimulation techniques to restore sensation, mobility, and other functions to paralyzed limbs and organs. These medical devices hold enormous promise to advance the state of medical care, lower health costs, and improve the quality of life for countless Americans. The rules will allow these new types of MedRadio devices to access 24 megahertz of spectrum in the 413-419, 426-432, 438-444, and 451-457 MHz bands on a secondary basis.

POSTAL RATES HAVE GONE UP

BACKGROUND:

Prices for most Postal Service mailing services will change on January 22, 2012. Mailing services includes First-Class Mail, Standard Mail, Periodicals, Package Services and Extra Services. Prices for shipping services will also change on January 22. We will provide customers the new shipping services prices later this fall.

While actual percentage price increases for various products and services varies, the overall average price increase across all mailing services is capped by law at 2.1 percent, the rate of inflation as measured by the Consumer Price Index. FIRST-CLASS MAIL HIGHLIGHTS:

- Letters (1 oz.) 1-cent increase to 45 cents. This is the first increase in the price of a First-Class Mail stamp since May 2009.
- Single-piece letters additional ounce rate unchanged at 20 cents.
- Postcards 3-cent increase to 32 cents
- Letters to Canada or Mexico (1 oz.) 5-cent increase to 85 cents
- Letters to other international destinations 7-cent increase to \$1.05
- The second ounce will be free for First-Class Mail Presort pieces weighing between one and two ounces. ADDITIONAL PRICE ADJUSTMENT HIGHLIGHTS:
- The price increase for Standard Mail Letters is slightly below the overall average at less than 1.9 percent
- A new 3-month pricing option will be available to rent PO Boxes for people on the move and others that need a PO Box for a shorter time period.
- ■ Delivery Confirmation will be free for several parcel products as the Postal Service continues to make tracking an integral component of parcels mailed at commercial rates.

Going along with February. being The American Heart Month and the fact that heart disease including stroke the leading cause of death for men and women in the United States. We welcomed Dr. K. Khalighi, a member of the Easton Cardiovascular Associates to speak at our meeting.

Dr. Khalighi presented, with sides, brief background on the heart, its make up and how it functions. Using a house as an example, with plumbing and electrical circuits.

He spoke on reduced blood flow as being the most common occurrence for heart related problems, the various methods to restore normal blood flow. The use of balloons .and Stents to open these areas.

Dr. Khalighi moved on to pacemakers their purpose and how they are placed in the body. Showing several examples of pacemakers. And how they have changed in size over the years. Defibrillators and how they were used to restore normal rhythm after a heart problem was the next topic. He then showed how defibrillators were inserted into the chest. These were when these defibrillators were large and bulky. The modern defibrillator is due to its smaller size just mounted under the skin on the chest. Several examples of the early large heavy units were passed around, followed by the smaller lighter modern units.

Dr. Khalighi concluded with what is most necessary to good heart health, that being good diet and exercise. There was a question and answer session following his presentation.
